# ACCEPTING YOUR OFFER

This section provides important information on accepting your offer to study at La Trobe University. Please read the information carefully.

La Trobe University has been approved as an eligible university by the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) for Streamlined Visa Processing (SVP). SVP allows applicants for eligible courses (a Bachelor or Master's degree or a Doctor of Philosophy or a package with one of these courses) to be assessed under the lowest risk Assessment Level irrespective of the Assessment Level assigned for that country. ## LA TROBE INTERNATIONAL AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVES

Have you submitted your application through one of La Trobe International's authorised representatives?

### Assessment Level 1 and 2

If you hold a passport from an Assessment Level 1 or 2 country, your eligibility for visa purposes was assessed by your agent when you submitted your application. To accept your offer, send the following to La Trobe International through your La Trobe International agent:

- completed and signed Offer Acceptance Form
- payment for the required deposit as set out in your Letter of Offer
- certified evidence of meeting any conditions specified in your Letter of Offer, where applicable
- a Financial Guarantee Letter from your sponsoring organisation (if you are a Sponsored Student).

Your Offer Acceptance Form provides information on how you can pay for your deposit.

### Assessment Level 3 and 4

If you hold a passport from an Assessment Level 3 or 4 country, your eligibility for visa purposes was partially assessed by your La Trobe University representative when you submitted your application.

You will also be required to demonstrate you have adequate funds to support your studies by sending the following to La Trobe International:

- completed and signed Offer Acceptance Form
- certified evidence of meeting any conditions specified in your Letter of Offer, where applicable
- a Financial Guarantee Letter from your sponsoring organisation (if you are a Sponsored Student)
- completed and signed Applicant Financial Declaration Form.

If the University is satisfied that you are eligible for SVP, you will receive confirmation of this in writing and only then will you be asked to forward your payment for the required deposit as set out in your Letter of Offer. Do not send your payment until your eligibility for SVP has been determined.

For students who are commencing their studies in mid-year, please note a new simplified student visa framework may be applicable. On 16 June 2015, the Australian Government released the Future directions for streamlined visa processing report and announced the introduction of a simplified student visa framework (SSVF) to support Australia's education services sector.

# PREPARING FOR DEPARTURE

### PREPARING YOURSELF

When you first arrive in Australia you may be feeling excited and a little anxious. It may be hard to leave friends and family behind. You may find it difficult to settle in. To help adjust to Australian life, keep in mind the following suggestions:

- Find someone to talk to about how you are feeling. You may want to discuss your concerns with friends and family, particularly those who have also travelled abroad. You could also talk to someone from International Student Services or Counselling Services about how you are feeling, and what you can do to adjust more quickly.
- Join E-friends-Transition @ La Trobe (see page 5).
- Along with other new students, participate in an online pre-departure briefing. The scheduled sessions for 2016 are on page 5.
- Make sure you arrive in time to register, enrol and participate in the University Orientation. See page 51. This is the best way to ensure you adjust as soon as possible to living in Australia and studying at La Trobe, and it will assist you academically. You will learn important information, as well as meet other students and staff, and make new friends.

### ONLINE PRE-DEPARTURE RRIFFINGS

You will receive an invitation email to join an online pre-departure briefing approximately a week before the dates that are set out on page 5. All commencing students and their families can join in. The webinars are designed to help you prepare for study and life in Australia. During the briefing you can ask questions and receive quick answers from our International Student Services, as well as Accommodation Services staff. Topics covered include: preparing for departure, accommodation, living in Australia, and arrival and settling in. Some webinars are for Australia Awards students only.

Make sure you join a webinar 30 minutes earlier than the times specified to ensure you gain access in time.

### **Melbourne Campus**

This is the largest of La Trobe University's campuses and one of the most attractive university campuses in Australia. It covers 267 hectares (660 acres) of stunning parkland with its own waterways and a wildlife sanctuary. It is located in the Melbourne suburb of Bundoora, 14 km (8.7 miles) from the Melbourne city centre. Please refer to this calendar when booking flights or making holiday arrangements. Also remember to book any departure flights after the exam period has finished, not on the semester end date. Some courses may have different commencement dates. We recommend you refer to your Letter of Offer for your exact commencement and/or Enrolment and University Orientation dates.

### APPLYING FOR A STUDENT VISA

You will need to use your Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) to apply for a student visa, at your nearest Australian Diplomatic Mission (Embassy). You will receive your CoE from La Trobe International after you have accepted your offer.

You may also be required to demonstrate that you have sufficient funds to cover your tuition fees and living expenses (the Department of Immigration and Border Protection's suggested living costs for international students is approximately AUD\$18,610 per annum). Your Visa Assessment Level generally determines the information you will be required to submit as part of your visa application to the Australian Diplomatic Mission.

However, if you are eligible for Streamlined Visa Processing (SVP), you will be assessed as if you are an Assessment Level 1 (AL1) student. See page 3 for further information on SVP. If you are ineligible for SVP, your student Visa Assessment Level is determined by your country of citizenship and the type of course/s you will be studying.

Only those students who are from Visa Assessment Level 1 countries can be granted their initial student visa while in Australia.

Everyone else (from countries with Visa Assessment Levels 2-4) must obtain a student visa before travelling to Australia. For more information on Visa Assessment Levels, please refer to Student Visa Program – Assessment Levels (formerly Form 1219i):

### Student visa conditions

The Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) issues student visas with a number of conditions attached, including, but not limited to, the following conditions:

**8105** – You cannot undertake work until you have commenced your course in Australia. You cannot work more than 40 hours per fortnight when your course is in session.

# A fortnight means any period of 14 days commencing on a Monday up to the end of the second following Sunday.

Some volunteer and unpaid work (other than work that has been registered as a part of your course) is also included in the 40 hours per fortnight limit: see page 60-61 for what's included. No work limits apply during vacation periods.

If you have a subclass 574 (Postgraduate Research) visa you can work unlimited hours once you have commenced your research degree. However according to your candidature rules you can only undertake a maximum of eight hours of paid employment per week between 9am and 5pm Monday to Friday.

**8202** – You must remain enrolled in a registered course, satisfy academic requirements, make satisfactory academic progress, and complete your course within the time stated on your CoE.

**8501** – You must maintain adequate arrangements for health insurance cover during your entire stay in Australia.

**8532** – If you have not reached 18 years of age, you must maintain adequate arrangements for your accommodation, support and general welfare for the duration of your stay in Australia. To maintain adequate arrangements for welfare you must stay in Australia:

- with your parent or legal custodian
- with an eligible relative who has been nominated by your parents or legal custodians, who is aged over 21 and is of good character, or
- within accommodation, support and general welfare arrangements that have been approved by the University.

**8533** – You must advise the University within seven days of your arrival in Australia of your current residential address and of any changes of address within seven days of each change. You must notify your education provider if you have changed universities or education providers within seven days of receiving your CoE or evidence of enrolment

**8516** – You must continue to satisfy the requirements for the granting of your student visa. This means, for example, that your main course of study must continue to be a course in the education sector that matches your student visa, and that you must continue to have sufficient financial capacity to support your study and stay in Australia.

Your visa is subject to a number of visa conditions that you must comply with. Different

visa conditions apply to you and your family members. Breaching a visa condition may result in the cancellation of your visa.

### Students with school-aged children

If you have school-aged dependants accompanying you to Australia, it is a visa requirement that you enrol them in primary or secondary school.

If you are the recipient of an Australian government scholarship that covers the entire cost of your tuition fees (e.g. Endeavour Postgraduate Award), if you hold a 576 (Foreign Affairs or Defence Sector Scholarship) or 574 (Postgraduate Research) visa, you are not required to pay school fees for your dependants at government schools in Victoria.

You will otherwise be required to pay school fees for your dependants whether they are enrolled at a government or non-government school. The minimum fee payable at Victorian government primary schools in 2015 was AUD\$10,168 per year. More detailed information on schools, the Australian curriculum, and fees is available at:

### OSHC by Allianz Global Assistance

If you have purchased your Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) with Allianz Global Assistance through La Trobe University, we will give you instructions on how to obtain your card once you arrive at La Trobe University. If you hold a student visa and have paid for your cover in advance, your OSHC cover is valid from the date you arrive in Australia. If you obtain cover from another provider you are advised to confirm directly with that provider of when your

### LIVING AND TRAVELLING SAFELY – THINGS TO CONSIDER IN ADVANCE

### Scams

Scams operate all over the world through email, SMS messaging, internet social sites, and person to person. Travellers or people new to a culture or country may be particularly vulnerable to offers of assistance. We strongly advise you not to commit to any transaction (e.g. accommodation or money transfer) until you have arrived.

- A scam is an unjust scheme devised to take your money in a dishonest or deceitful way and give little or nothing in return.
- Scams generally involve organisations or individuals operating under unregistered or fraudulent names.
- Scammers are hard to find and have no compassion for their victims.
- Scams often prey on people's vulnerability and use lies and tricks to convince you they are genuine.

We strongly recommend you apply caution to any transaction before arrival in Australia visit the Consumer Affairs Victoria website or seek advice from La Trobe International

### Currency and banking

Australia's unit of currency is the Australian dollar (AUD\$), which is divided into 100 cents. Coins have values of 5, 10, 20 and 50 cents, and AUD\$1 and AUD\$2; notes have values of AUD\$5, AUD\$10, AUD\$20. AUD\$50 and AUD\$100.

Travellers Cheques are one of the safest ways to carry funds into Australia. Brands like American Express and Thomas Cook are widely accepted, and can be cashed at banks, foreign exchange brokers and larger hotels. Passport identification (ID) is required when you cash Travellers Cheques. You must declare amounts of AUD\$10,000 or more in foreign or Australian currency that you bring into Australia.

Major credit and debit cards – Visa and MasterCard – are accepted throughout Australia. Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs, or cash points) with 24-hour access seven days a week are available in many locations such as shopping centres, petrol stations, convenience stores, banks, along main shopping strips and in malls or plazas, as well as on campus.

Savings or cheque account access cards – connected to the Maestro or Cirrus electronic networks – can be used in ATMs around Australia. If your card does not have the Maestro or Cirrus logo on it, we recommend you confirm with your financial institution if you can use your card in Australia before you leave home. Check all terms and conditions and how you can access your funds while in Australia to ensure that you are aware of the fees associated with your choices.

These banking institutions have offices at La Trobe University's Melbourne Campus. The Pulse Credit Union also has facilities at the Albury-Wodonga and Bendigo campuses. It is recommended you open an account before leaving home (as you will only need your passport to withdraw funds when you arrive in Australia) rather than carrying around large amounts of cash, which is unsafe. Once you open a bank account, you can transfer funds from overseas to be ready for you when you arrive.

When opening a bank account, ask about student accounts that may attract lower or no account-keeping fees.

### Safety when carrying money

Don't carry large amounts of cash and don't make it obvious you are carrying money.

- Only carry the amount necessary for your arrival and the first few days. Enquire whether your financial institution at home, or your family, may transfer funds into your account after your arrival.
- Talk to your financial institution at home as early as possible, to find out how to transfer funds and the costs of such transactions.
- Consider opening a bank account at an Australian bank before you leave home, but you'll need to be 100 per cent sure you are coming to Australia, as you can only access these funds once you have arrived and provided adequate identification.

Electronic Funds Transfer at Point of Sale (EFTPOS) terminals can be found where most goods or services are sold, ranging from supermarkets, service stations and restaurants to doctors' clinics and gymnasiums. You can pay for goods and make payments through EFTPOS using your ATM bank card, rather than paying with cash. At some stores, when you use EFTPOS you can also withdraw cash from your account at the same time, and this transaction is usually free. You should be aware that retailers may limit how much cash can be withdrawn, which may be dependent on the amount that you spend.

When paying by EFTPOS or using an ATM, you use your PIN (Personal Identification Number) to access your account.

Strict rules apply about keeping the PIN confidential: never give your PIN to anyone and be careful no one looks over your shoulder while you enter your PIN at a terminal or cash point. In Australia, financial institutions will not guarantee the safety of your funds if you have given your PIN to any other person, even family members.

### Meeting people and making new friends

Australians are often noted as friendly people and you will probably meet many people

as soon as you arrive. As with any country in the world, when you meet anyone new, be cautious until you get to know the person better and feel you can trust them. If a stranger starts talking to you, they are probably just being friendly.

However, to be safe, don't give them any of your personal details such as your full name, your phone number or your address. You could offer to take their phone number if they suggest showing you around or helping you to settle into life in Australia. Do not give cash to someone to hold or make payments for you, and do not provide bank account or personal security access codes to anyone.

Many international students spend time with other students and people from their own country and culture while in Australia. These people can make you feel accepted and you may be able to communicate much more easily with them than you can with locals, particularly when you have just arrived. When everything around you is new and different, it can feel like a big relief to find people from your own country and cultural background.

But remember, you need to be careful at first, until you get to know them better, just as you should with anyone else. Even though you may feel like you have a lot in common, remain cautious until you feel you know them reasonably well and can trust them. Many crimes against international students are committed by people from their own culture.

### Choosing where to live before you leave home

Choosing where to live in a new country is a big decision and there are many factors to consider. We strongly advise you not to accept or pay in advance for any long-term off campus accommodation without first inspecting it to check the suitability of the premises.

If you choose not to live on campus, it is advisable to contact La Trobe Accommodation Services to secure temporary accommodation for when you arrive. Alternatively we recommend AHN Homestay as a good temporary accommodation option – you can commit to as little as four weeks. The Accommodation section from page 26 provides more information.

### Getting around safely

La Trobe University maintains a commitment to the safety of all students, and La Trobe International has considerable knowledge about the experiences of international students during their time in Australia. ### STUDENTS UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE

If you are under 18 years of age at the commencement of your course, you are required by the Australian Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) to have appropriate welfare and accommodation arrangements in Australia. To obtain a student visa, underage students need to provide evidence that they will be living with either a DIBP-approved parent, legal custodian or an eligible relative in Australia, or have arranged welfare and accommodation that satisfies La Trobe University's requirements.

# Option 1 – DIBP's approved welfare arrangement

Underage students must have their parents (or legal custodian) nominate a suitable guardian, who resides in Australia, before DIBP will consider their student visa application. Parents must lodge the Nomination of a



Student Guardian Form (157N) available from the Australian Diplomatic Mission (Embassy) in their home country. DIBP requires this guardian to be over 21 years old, an eligible relative and of good character.

## Option 2 - La Trobe University's approved welfare and accommodation arrangements

If underage students do not have an eligible relative in Australia, they will need to be supported by the services of La Trobe University's approved welfare and accommodation providers. Upon receipt of proof that these providers have been engaged (e.g. copies of contracts), La Trobe University will issue a CoE and a Confirmation of Appropriate Accommodation/Welfare (CAAW) Form for students to use when they apply for their student visa. # STUDENTS WITH FAMILIES

Read this section if your spouse and/or children will be with you while you study. You can get a lot more information in our comprehensive Students with Spouse and/or Children Guide at: latrobe.edu.au/students/international/support/publications

We recommend you arrive first, settle into studies, find appropriate accommodation and then arrange for your family to join you. This will allow you to settle into academic life before your family joins you in Australia, and enable you to take time to prepare for their arrival and get settled. We also recommend you encourage your family to read about Australia and send them pictures of your accommodation. Your family could also speak with friends or relatives who have been to Australia. The International Student Services team at La Trobe International (LTI) can provide a range of information and support whether or not your family arrived with you.

#### **ACCOMMODATION**

There are two on-campus accommodation options for families at the Melbourne Campus: Barnes Way Apartments or Waterdale Road Apartments. However, it may be difficult to secure this accommodation in your first year of study, because you need to be on campus to sign a lease:

### **VISA REQUIREMENTS**

The following procedures are specific to students who come to Australia and who then apply to have their family join them as dependants. After you are settled, complete a 919 Student Dependant Nomination Form and send it to your family to lodge with their visa applications. Forms can be obtained from the DIBP website: border.gov.au

A letter certifying that you are a LaTrobe University student can be requested from Ask LaTrobe at your campus.

### **SPOUSES**

The International Student Services team also support students' spouses. We can provide information and referrals to assist spouses to develop their support networks, find out more about Australia and improve their English.

# Work rights for spouses (including de facto spouses)

Spouses holding Student Dependant visas automatically receive Permission to Work (PTW) within Australia.

Please note spouses on a Student Dependant visa:

- must not commence work until the student visa holder has commenced classes
- are limited to 40 hours work per fortnight at all times, unless the primary visa holder has commenced a Master's or Doctoral degree and holds a subclass 573 (Higher Education), 574 (Postgraduate Research) or 576 (Foreign Affairs/Defence) student visa. In these cases a dependent family member may work any number of hours.

### **CHILD CARE**

If your spouse or partner is unable to care for your children because of their own study or work commitments, you will need to find suitable child care. We strongly encourage you to start planning for child care prior to arriving in Australia. Child care can be community-based, organised by the local council, or run by private companies. In all cases, there are usually waiting lists for places and it is generally expensive. Australia Awards students may be eligible to receive childcare benefits from the Australian Government. ### On-campus childcare

Most campuses provide students and staff with access to childcare facilities. Some students may be eligible for a childcare subsidy; however, there are usually waiting lists for places.

### SCHOOL

If you have school-aged dependants accompanying you to Australia, it is a visa requirement that you enrol them in primary school (grades K-6) or secondary school (grades 7-12). You need to apply for your child's school on a Dependant Application Form, and accept your Letter of Offer by paying the invoice.

You will then be issued with a Letter of Confirmation of your child's enrolment that you need to lodge with your Student Dependant Nomination Form.

You will be required to pay school fees for your dependants at a government school, unless you fall into one of the following categories:

- you are the recipient of an Australian Government scholarship and hold a 576 (Foreign Affairs or Defence scholarship – see the Australia Awards students section on page 19)
- you hold a 574 (Postgraduate Research) visa
- you are receiving an Endeavour Postgraduate Award that covers the entire cost of your tuition fees.

Even if you are exempt from paying tuition fees for your dependants at government schools, there will still be administrative and other costs. If you choose a non-government school, tuition and other fees apply.

- The minimum annual fee payable in Victorian government schools in 2015 was AUD\$10,168 (subject to change). Albury-Wodonga students can consider enrolling their children in a New South Wales (NSW) school. In NSW, the annual tuition fees for dependants at government schools in 2015 started at AUD\$10,000 for primary school (grades K-6). Please note that some international students have been able to negotiate lower fees for their children at non-government schools.
- All schools in Victoria with international students must meet strict accreditation criteria, and these accredited schools are regularly assessed and reviewed.

The schools closest to La Trobe University's Melbourne Campus are located in the 'City North' section of the map.

For secondary school (high school) the Victorian Government has issued the Right School Right Place Guide to help international students find the right school. The guide profiles 91 accredited secondary schools (82 schools in metropolitan Melbourne and nine in regional Victoria) containing information about their location, number of students, special programs, contact details and a brief overview of the school environment. # SPONSORED STUDENTS

Sponsored students receive financial assistance from a government, organisation or company (not private individuals or relatives) to undertake studies at La Trobe University.

### **New sponsors**

If your sponsor organisation is not currently registered with La Trobe University, our Sponsored Programs team or your Admissions Officer will ask your sponsor to complete a Sponsor Registration Form, which is available from:

Once your sponsorship registration is approved, the Sponsored Programs team at La Trobe International will act as the central contact between you, your sponsor and the University in matters relating to administration of your sponsorship at La Trobe University. Both sponsored students and their sponsor should note that non-payment of tuition fees by the designated due date may result in the sponsored student being unable to:

### **MORE HELP**

- access their library, student email or StudentOnLine accounts
- re-enrol in any course or subject
- receive results of any assessments
- receive an academic transcript
- graduate or receive any academic award.

### **Sponsored Student Orientation**

All commencing sponsored students must attend a briefing during University Orientation at the start of Semester 1 and 2. This includes students who were previously enrolled at La Trobe Melbourne undertaking ELICOS, Diploma's or Foundation Studies.

## Enrolment conditions for sponsored students

When you accept your offer to study at La Trobe, you sign your agreement with us to communicate with your sponsor on your behalf. From time to time, we contact your sponsor about your academic progress, tuition fees, or other matters relating to your progress.

Sponsored Students must first seek advice from Sponsored Programs in La Trobe International if they want to make any of these variations to their enrolment:

- change of course preference
- change of major
- enrolling in less than a full-time load (underloading)
- leave of absence (including deferral or suspension)
- discontinuation (withdrawal) from a course.

Your variation request is subject to sponsor approval under the agreement La Trobe

University has with your sponsor, and you must get their permission before the change is processed. You must first contact Sponsored Programs for assistance before proceeding with a change through your college.

# EXTENSION OF STUDIES AND SPONSORSHIP

Sponsored Students who experience difficulties during their studies, and find they need to extend the length of their stay in Australia must contact Sponsored Programs. This needs to be done at least three months prior to the original course end date or visa expiry date (whichever date is earlier) to seek necessary approval and documents from their sponsor.

Sponsored students should ensure they are fully aware of their specific sponsorship conditions, including any conditions about extensions.

### Academic monitoring

Sponsored students also agree that the University will liaise with their sponsor regarding their enrolment status, academic progress, and related sponsorship issues.

### **SCHOLARSHIPS**

Some international students may receive a partial scholarship for their studies from La Trobe University. This is applied against tuition fees and is reflected on the student's statement of accounts.

For high achieving continuing students there are excellence scholarships awarded by the colleges.

### AUSTRALIA AWARDS

Australia Awards are prestigious scholarships for international students from developing countries who are chosen to study in Australia to further the national priorities of their home country. The sponsor is the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT).

### Contact officers

The Australia Awards contact officers at La Trobe University are also the sponsored students team. They organise the Introductory Academic Program (IAP) at the beginning of each semester, and provide advice and support during your studies.

All Australia Awards students must retain a copy of the Australia Awards Scholarships Policy Handbook, as it is their key reference document in relation to the administration of Australia Awards. The Handbook is updated annually in January and can be downloaded from: dfat.gov.au/about-us/publications/Pages/australia-awards-scholarships-policy-handbook.aspx

### Academic support

Australia Awards students are encouraged to utilise all available academic support to enhance their studies, within their college, the Student Learning unit, and through the Supplementary Academic Support funds available as part of their scholarship.

### **US FINANCIAL AID**

La Trobe University participates in the William D. Ford Direct Loan Program. La Trobe administers Stafford and PLUS loans for US citizens or eligible non-citizens who meet criteria, including but not limited to the following:

### Accessing US Financial Aid Loans

Once LTI has assessed and certified your loan with the US Department of Education, the funds should arrive in Australia within two weeks following the disbursement date.

Once your funds have been disbursed from the US you will be asked to come to LTI. You will

need to provide your banking details and complete the William D. Ford Direct Loan Program Reconciliation Form for the funds transfer

Loans are usually due for disbursement on the first day of each semester, after you have officially commenced classes and your attendance is confirmed by the college.

The funds will first be allocated to your tuition fees, and any remaining funds will be refunded to your nominated bank account, for your living expenses.

**Important!** Students enrolled in any online subjects will not be eligible for US Financial Aid funds. Therefore, ensure you do not enrol in online subjects.

## Who is eligible to receive US Financial Aid loans?

La Trobe University participates in the William D. Ford Direct Loan Program.
La Trobe administers Stafford and PLUS loans for US citizens or eligible non-citizens who meet criteria, including but not limited to the following:

- being enrolled at least half-time in a degree program
- making satisfactory academic progress
- not being in default from a previous loan.

### Will I receive US Financial Aid funds?

You will receive US Financial Aid funds if you meet all eligibility criteria including those mentioned above, if you have submitted a Financial Aid Application Form, and submitted any of the necessary documentation to La Trobe International. It is important that you make financial plans for your university studies in advance. So if you are planning to apply for US Financial Aid, get a head start by contacting the La Trobe International Financial Aid Officer as soon as you receive your Letter of Offer.

# I have applied for US Financial Aid. How do I get the money and what is the process?

Once La Trobe International has assessed and certified your loan with the US Department of Education, the funds should arrive in Australia within two weeks following the disbursement date.

Loans are usually due for disbursement on the first day of each semester, after you have officially commenced classes and your attendance is confirmed by the college. Once your funds have been disbursed from the US and you have arrived at La Trobe you will be asked to come into La Trobe International office. You will need to provide your banking details and complete the William D. Ford Direct Loan Program Reconciliation Form for the funds transfer. This reconciliation form will outline the amount to be allocated to your tuition fees and living expenses. The funds will first be allocated to your tuition fees, and any remaining funds will be refunded to your nominated bank account, for your living expenses.



# COSTS COSTS

The table below shows estimated average annual costs for a single student sharing rental accommodation, living in a one bedroom flat, living in Homestay (that is, living with a family or individual in their home) or living on campus (non-catered).

These costs are based on 2015 prices. You should allow for a four to five per cent increase in living expenses. Total figures are for the 36 weeks of the academic year only. We have excluded the cost of clothing or travel expenses for leisure purposes.

### **TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION**

There are a number of options when you first arrive, while you settle in and look for longer-term accommodation.

### **AHN Homestay**

Homestay is one of the safest and most convenient ways you can begin your time in Australia

The Australian Homestay Network (AHN) is a national team of experienced and dedicated staff using a unique Homestay database and communication system for managing Homestay placements throughout Australia. Students are matched with a suitable Australian host according to their specific needs and the La Trobe University campus location. AHN Homestay is available for temporary accommodation at all of our campuses.

With Homestay, students have access to a fully-furnished room and amenities. Most initial placements are for four weeks unless a longer period is requested.

Students are welcome to extend their initial Homestay placement and can choose from a range of additional AHN Homestay and meal options, for example:

- traditional full-meals Homestay
- dinner-only Homestay, or
- no meals Homestay.

# Benefits of short-term accommodation with Homestay

- Settle into a new culture and community with the help of fully-trained AHN hosts.
- You will receive assistance with everyday conversational skills.

### **IMPORTANT THINGS TO CONSIDER**

Before you start looking for accommodation, be clear on what you require regardless of the La Trobe University campus you will be attending. Ask yourself the following questions:

### Location

### Do you want to live on or off campus?

Please note all AHN Homestay placements take a maximum of 30 minutes travel on public transport to your campus.

It is strongly recommended that you search for accommodation in the suburbs close to your campus as well as consider the travel time by public transport or car to your campus.

### Will you rely on public transport?

If so, consider living either on campus, or close to major bus, tram or train services to the University and to the city.

### Will you look for part-time work?

If so, consider where you will look for work and how you will get to your workplace. What time will you work, and what transport is available for when you start and finish?

### Are you part of a group of students?

If so, whole vacant properties off campus or the University apartments at Barnes Way or Waterdale Road (at the Melbourne Campus) might suit your needs (see page 32). If you choose to live in off-campus accommodation, you should familiarise yourself with standard leases, condition reports and other tenancy information that is available from the Tenants Union of Victoria (from the South West Tenants Advice Service if you are living in Albury or Sydney). See pages 29 and 36.

### Safety and transition

If you are a student who has not lived independently before, if you have not studied at university, or if you are from a country where the academic culture is very different to that in Australia, we strongly recommend you consider living on campus, or with a host in AHN Homestay. This way, you can concentrate on making the considerable transition to studying in an Australian tertiary institution, while receiving emotional and practical support.

### **Facilities**

### Do you want your own room?

The layout of the property is also important, particularly if you are sharing with others. When enquiring about sharing, you should ask about many things – food, cleaning, cooking, utility bills, smoking, parties and noise, pets, small children, and visits from family, friends or partners – before you decide whether the house is right for you.

## Are you willing to share bathroom and kitchen facilities?

If not, an off-campus one-bedroom apartment might be a better option. In some privately-run student accommodation, you have your own bathroom but you share a kitchen.

### Do you want meals provided?

If so, do you have any special dietary requirements, such as vegetarian, halal or kosher food?

### Will you need furniture?

All on-campus rooms are furnished, but most off-campus rooms are unfurnished. If you don't want to organise furniture, then full-board (e.g. Homestay or privately-run student accommodation) is your best option. In an established share household, you may only need to furnish your own bedroom.

# Which utilities (electricity, gas, etc.) will you need?

If you rent a whole vacant property off-campus you will need to connect gas, electricity, water, internet service, and a landline telephone if you need one. You also have these costs in some University apartments on campus.

### Costs

### Legal questions

### How long do you require accommodation?

If it is for less than six months you may have difficulty getting a lease on a private rental property. Six-month leases are sometimes available but the standard length of a lease for off-campus accommodation in Victoria is 12 months.

### Are you willing to sign a lease?

If not, your options are limited to Homestay, some share accommodation and privately-run student accommodation. If problems arise, you won't have as much protection as you would with a lease.

### Rental rights and responsibilities

When moving into a vacant house on your own, you will need to pay for connection fees for utilities (electricity, gas, telephone), furniture, a bond (usually equivalent to one calendar month's rent), plus one month's rent in advance. Before you start a tenancy (sign a lease or pay a bond), it is advisable to know your legal rights and responsibilities as a tenant, and those of the agent or landlord.

If you want to share with others, we recommend that all tenants are listed on utility bills (e.g. electricity, phone, gas, water). If your name is on a utility bill, you are legally responsible for its payment, so it is best to ensure that all other tenants are listed.

In share accommodation you generally move into an established house, flat or unit. Connection fees are already paid and the rest of the house is usually furnished, but you may have to furnish your own bedroom.

Make sure you understand all the conditions of any contract you sign, as well as payment and bond conditions and procedures. Do not sign any contract or document if you are unsure of what you are agreeing to. More advice on choosing accommodation and suitable roommates is available at:

We strongly advise you not to accept any long-term off-campus accommodation without first inspecting and checking the suitability of the premises.

Do not sign anything if you are not sure of what you are agreeing to. Make sure you understand all the conditions of any contract you sign, as well as the payment and bond conditions and procedures. ### ON-CAMPUS ACCOMMODATION

Results of an Australasian Survey of Student Engagement (AUSSE, 2008) show that 'students living in residence are equally, and in many instances, more engaged than others, particularly in terms of participation in active learning and enriching experiences, their interactions with staff, and their perceptions of support'. On the Melbourne Campus, all first-year students are placed in a Study Focus Group with trained, student mentors.

All on-campus accommodation is mixed gender. Each of the seven residences offer different lifestyles, facilities and services depending on your preferences. ### Undergraduate residential colleges

The three residential colleges – Glenn, Chisholm and Menzies – are located in the heart of the Melbourne Campus. They provide single furnished study-bedrooms, a shared kitchen, bathroom and laundry facilities, and communal recreational and study areas.

All utilities, including water, electricity and internet are included in the residential fees.

The colleges are popular with undergraduate students, as they run regular social, sporting and cultural events and provide academic and emotional support. Glenn College is catered (breakfast and dinner), while Chisholm and Menzies colleges are not.

# **TOP 10 REASONS TO LIVE ON CAMPUS**

### **1. BETTER SCORES**

Students living on campus have been shown to achieve better academic results than the general student population (Burge, L 2012 'Infinite possibilities: exploring opportunities for non-traditional students to become global citizens', *Widening Participation and Lifelong Learning*, 13, Special Issue: 6–18).

### 2. CONVENIENT LOCATION

For most on-campus residents, your class is no more than a five-minute walk away. This also means you have better access to other university support services including the library and computer labs.

### 3. CARE AND SUPPORT

Get the support you need from students who have done it all before. At each residence a team of student leaders are always on hand to help out those who might be struggling with homesickness or who need a helping hand.

### 4. 24-HOUR SECURITY AND SUPPORT

Students living on campus have access to a 24/7 helpline with direct access to on-site residential and security staff members. At the Melbourne Campus, there is also an after-hours security bus that can escort you to and from the number 86 tram on Plenty Road late at night.

### 5. ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAMS

On-campus accommodation provides a number of academic support programs, including the first-year mentoring program, textbook buying scheme, NET support program, and Specialist Subject Tutors.

### 6. EXTENSIVE ORIENTATION PROGRAMS

Living on campus also means that you can meet and make friends easily, and the first time you meet them is during the Accommodation Services' week-long Orientation Program when you arrive.

### 7. DIVERSE ACTIVITIES

If you like photography, drama, sports, music and other social activities, living on campus gives you access to these kinds of activities. You will have plenty of opportunities to become the next 'Australian Idol' or 'Aussie Rules' superstar.

### 8. 'NO FUSS' PAYMENTS

Worried about money? Living on campus means you have a simple payment system, with everything included. It also means you only pay for an academic year rental agreement of 36 weeks rather than 52 weeks if you were living off campus (and if you travel during the summer break).

### 9. SUBSIDISED OVERSEAS TRIPS

Have you ever wanted to see the world? Accommodation Services offers students the chance to participate in two to three week community and outreach programs to places such as Cambodia, Nepal, Thailand or Vanuatu. This is your opportunity to make a difference!

### **10. STUDENT LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES**

Returning to residence means you have the chance to give back to our wonderful community by becoming a Student Leader. Get involved in our comprehensive training program, develop new skills and make the experiences of new residents just as good as yours were when you first arrived.

### Postgraduate residences

These residences offer a quieter, more independent lifestyle than the three colleges. Both are self-catered and offer single and shared rooms. Although limited, there are rooms for couples with double beds. Each residence has shared lounge areas, fully-equipped kitchens, self-service laundries and recreational facilities.

### The University Lodge

The University Lodge is housed in magnificent 1920s-style Edwardian buildings. Within walking distance is the Macleod train station (with regular train services to the city) and a small local shopping centre.

### **Graduate House**

Graduate House is a friendly collegial-style residence located in a residential area on the northern edge of the campus. It specialises in accommodation for mature age and postgraduate students, whether single or a couple. However, no children are permitted.

### Self-contained apartments

Prospective residents for Waterdale and Barnes Way apartments need to personally inspect an apartment and attend an interview, before their application will be considered.

### **SMOKE DETECTORS**

Do not tamper with a smoke detector in your room. Detectors are part of the electrical wiring. If tampered with, they will activate the fire alarm and you will have to pay for any costs. See page 45 for more infomation.

### **Waterdale Apartments**

Waterdale Apartments offer lower-cost, apartment-style accommodation. Located on the edge of the campus, each unit consists of three single bedrooms, a living area, bathroom and kitchen for self-catering. The cost of utilities such as electricity and gas are not included in the residential fees.

### **Barnes Way Apartments**

With the exception of five single-bed studio apartments, these flats are leased as whole properties (not on a room-by-room basis) to students who apply as one group. The cost of utilities such as electricity and gas are not included in the residential fees.

Please note: It is highly recommended that the Waterdale and Barnes Way apartments on the Melbourne Campus are personally inspected before prospective residents submit an application.

Offers cannot be made for the apartments before arrival in Melbourne. Residents must agree on the final persons included in their accommodation group. Application fees, payable bond and compulsory fee amounts can be found at the Accommodation Services website:

### Off-campus accommodation

La Trobe International recommends that students who have never lived on their own or studied overseas before should consider living on campus or in AHN Homestay. If you choose these types of accommodation, you will have friendly people around to give you advice on transport, living skills and Australian culture, while you make the considerable transition to studying in an Australian university.

### Private rental or shared accommodation

If you choose to rent privately, first think about what suburb would suit you. You also need to determine what is most important: see page 27 for questions you should consider. Suburbs located on train lines nearest to the Melbourne campus include Reservoir, Bundoora, Preston, Thomastown, Greensborough, Macleod, Watsonia and Heidelberg.

You might also like to live closer to the CBD or city, along the 250 bus route, or along the number 86 tram route (see pages 43 and 44). These suburbs include Northcote, Thornbury, Clifton Hill, Carlton, North Carlton, Collingwood, North Fitzroy and Fitzroy. However, generally, the closer you live to the city the more expensive the accommodation is.

The private rental market is generally very competitive and real estate agents or landlords may receive many applications for the one property. If you only book yourself into temporary accommodation and plan to rent privately, we recommend you arrive at least a week before your Registration and University Orientation date. It is advisable to bring with you referee reports and documentation of any rental history.

### On-campus accommodation

Different styles of accommodation are offered for up to 600 students and can be booked through La Trobe University Accommodation Services. Linen packs and a towel are available for purchase. ### The Units

Nine units, each with 12 furnished studybedrooms, a semi-equipped kitchen, two bathrooms and a mezzanine lounge area. The Units are self-catered.

#### The Terraces

Twenty-one furnished flats, each with eight study-bedrooms, twin bathrooms, laundry facilities, kitchen and lounge areas.
The Terraces are self-catered.

### **Hillside Apartments**

These apartments, which opened in 2012, provide modern spacious single rooms, shared kitchen and bathroom facilities, plus heating and cooling. There are six, three-storey buildings, and each floor has 12 bedrooms.

### The Villas

Twenty-eight modern small houses – villas – each with four study-bedrooms, a comfortable lounge area, small kitchen, separate laundry and bathroom. The villas are considered ideal for postgraduate or mature-age students.

### Orde House

Located in a more peaceful, quieter setting, Orde House is very popular for mature age and international students. With 24 private rooms, self-catering, shared bathrooms and laundry, communal living and kitchen, Orde House is located within a two-minute walk to the centre of the Campus.

## COMING TO AUSTRALIA

## AIRPORT RECEPTION

If you arrive at Melbourne Airport, La Trobe International (LTI) is pleased to provide you with a free airport reception service. There are two airports in Melbourne, located at Tullamarine and Avalon. If you are booking a domestic flight in Australia to come to Melbourne, it is recommended you fly into Tullamarine Airport, not Avalon Airport.

We do not offer an airport reception service from Avalon Airport, which is approximately a one-hour drive from the Melbourne Campus (55 km, or 34.1 miles).

This service is not available for students who have already commenced their course and are returning from holidays. The service is also not offered to students commencing at La Trobe Melbourne, which offers its own reception service.

## Essential details for all students

You can only book your airport reception once you have:

- accepted your offer to study at La Trobe University
- 2. confirmed your accommodation.

Airport reception at Melbourne Airport is free of charge for new La Trobe University students. Any other family members and friends who would like to also use the pick-up service have to pay the driver AUD\$30 (cash only) each.

When you arrive at the airport, look for a representative holding the green and yellow 'TOGOTO' sign. TOGOTO Australia is the official airport reception provider for La Trobe University.

## How to book: Melbourne Campus

### Online

Airport reception can be booked on the online Student Portal (ISIS). Only use the separate Online Booking Form if you do not have a username and password. Both the online Student Portal and booking forms are available at:

latrobe.edu.au/students/new-students/international/leaving/airport

If you are staying on campus, please give the name of the college or residence where you are staying as a booking number. If you are staying off campus (in a hotel/motel), you need to provide an accommodation booking confirmation number on the airport reception booking form. If you are staying at a private home with friends or relatives, please state 'friends or relatives' in the space provided for a booking number and provide the telephone number of your friend or relative.

## Deadline

Airport reception bookings must be received before 12pm (AEST), the day before your arrival or if you are arriving on a Saturday, Sunday or Monday, LTI must receive the booking by 12pm (AEST) on the preceding Friday.

If you are arriving on Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, or New Year's Eve (after 6pm), you need to take a taxi. La Trobe International will reimburse the taxi fare if you submit the receipt from the drive to our office.

## Confirmation and how to meet the driver

Once your booking is confirmed, you will receive an email with the map and information on how to meet the driver and what to do if your flight has been delayed or cancelled.

## Alternative transport to Melbourne Campus

If you do not wish to use the airport reception service, you can reach the LaTrobe University Melbourne Campus from the airport by:

- taxi (approximately a half-hour trip, AUD\$55, depending on travel time)
- a shuttle service such as the SkyBus from the airport to Southern Cross Railway Station (20 minute trip, AUD\$18 per person) or the Eastside Buslines Airport Bus to Heidelberg (AUD\$30 per person) or Preston (AUD\$25 per person), and then public or other transport to the University from Heidelberg or Preston. Eastside's Airport Bus can drop you at your accommodation if you pre-book: airportbus.com.au

Travel times to Albury-Wodonga are:

- from Melbourne 3.5 hours by train or 1 hour by plane
- from Sydney 6 hours by train or 1.25 hours by plane.

## TRAIN STATION RECEPTION

## Albury-Wodonga, Shepparton and Mildura

If you are arriving at Melbourne Airport and wish to make your onward journey by train, LTI can arrange for you to be met by TOGOTO at Melbourne Airport and taken to Southern Cross Station for your onward journey by V/Line train to Albury, Shepparton or Mildura. You will need to complete a Melbourne Airport Reception Online Booking Form (see under How to book for Melbourne Campus on page 38).

You will need to purchase a train ticket for your onward journey to Albury, Shepparton or Mildura at your own expense. Upon arrival in Albury, Shepparton or Mildura, a staff representative will pick you up and take you to your pre-arranged accommodation.

We recommend Mildura students continue on from Melbourne to Mildura by plane as it is 550 km (342 miles) from Melbourne. Please ensure you make relevant flight arrangements to travel to Mildura when booking your flight to Australia.

## Changing your booking: all students except Bendigo

If you have arranged for airport reception at Melbourne Airport and there are changes in your arrival details less than 24 hours before your scheduled arrival, you should inform the reception company TOGOTO of these changes immediately (this does not apply to Bendigo students).

## **AUSTRALIAN IMMIGRATION**

When you first arrive in Australia you will be required to make your way through Australian Immigration (follow the signs for Arriving Passengers as you leave the plane).

An immigration officer will ask to see your completed Incoming Passenger Card (given to you on the plane) along with your passport and student visa evidence. The immigration officer will check your documents and may ask you a few questions about your plans for your stay in Australia. Familiarise yourself with the expectations for travellers at:

## **BAGGAGE CLAIM**

Once you have passed through the immigration checks you will move to baggage claim (follow the signs) and collect your luggage. Check that nothing is missing or damaged. If this happens, go to the Baggage Counter and advise them of your problem. Staff at the Baggage Counter will help you to find your belongings or lodge a claim for damage.

## **QUARANTINE AND CUSTOMS**

Australia's quarantine and border protection laws are very strict. Many foods, plant products, animal products, products made of wood, shell, feather, and some medicines, cannot be brought into Australia. You are required to declare such items on your Incoming Passenger Card that you receive on the plane before disembarking.

If you declare an item, it may be inspected by a quarantine officer and it will be returned to you only if it passes inspection. Articles may need to be treated, at your cost, before being returned to you. If this does happen, the quarantine officer will outline the charge that applies to your item and if you agree, you will have to sign to accept the cost and provide a local address for the goods to be returned to you after treatment. If you do not declare items of quarantine concern, you may be liable for on-the-spot AUD\$340 fines (subject to change) or prosecution.

The Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service has prepared information for international students outlining what can and cannot be brought into the country and a guide for friends and family about postal mail to Australia. For further information in several languages read:

Australia also has strict laws in place to detect and defer unlawful movement of goods and people into the country. If you are bringing any medicines with you, check with your local Australian Diplomatic Mission (Embassy) to confirm if the amount and type of medicine you require is permitted in Australia.

It may be useful to bring a letter from your doctor describing the medicine and its purpose. For further information contact your local Australian Diplomatic Mission (Embassy) or see the Department of Immigration and Border Protection website:

## **Detector dogs**

You may see a quarantine detector dog at the baggage carousel or while waiting in line to pass through Customs. The dog screens luggage for food, plant material or animal products and other illegal items. If you see a detector dog working close to you, please place your bags on the floor for inspection. These dogs are not dangerous to humans and are trained to detect odours. Sometimes a dog will sit next to your bag if it sniffs a target odour. Dogs may detect odours left from food you have had in the bag. A quarantine officer may ask about the contents of your bag and check if you are not carrying items that present a quarantine risk to Australia.

## **CLIMATE**

Victoria is located in the south-east corner of Australia and enjoys a temperate climate with four distinct seasons:

## Spring

September to November

### Summer

December to February

### Autumn

March to May

### Winter

June to August

The hottest months are January and February, and the coolest months are usually July and August. In summer, temperatures can reach over 40°C, while in winter, around Victoria, temperatures range from around 2°C to 15°C.

The northern and central regions of Victoria (including Bendigo, Shepparton, Mildura and Albury-Wodonga) are usually warmer and drier than the south, with lower rainfall and higher temperatures in summer and cooler temperatures in winter.

Victoria, and in particular Melbourne, is known for its rapidly-changing weather and variations of temperature, especially due to climate change. It is a good idea to be prepared for 'four seasons in one day'. If you arrive from summer in the Northern Hemisphere, which would be for a Semester 2 (July) commencement, we recommend you have a jacket or coat in your hand or carry-on luggage for when you arrive.

# ARRIVAL AND SETTLING IN



## WHEN YOU FIRST ARRIVE

Contact home! Your family and friends want to know that you have arrived safely. It is very important to make contact with someone from home as soon as possible after your arrival.

## International phone calls

International calls can be made direct from all phones in Australia, including public payphones. Simply dial the following: the international access code (0011), your country code, the area code for your city (remember not to dial the first zero) and your family's phone number.

It's much cheaper if you buy an international phone card in one of the many shops on campus and off campus, including supermarkets, milk bars, convenience stores, petrol stations, newsagents, post offices and some pharmacies. Note that for some phone cards you still need to insert coins (usually 50 cents) into the payphone to be connected to the phone card service.

You can use your credit card to pay for phone calls at some of the payphones in the airport. If you are unsure of your home country's code or need further information contact:

## **Emergency**

To call the emergency services including the fire brigade, ambulance or police in Australia, phone '000' (triple-zero). This is a 24-hour service, and is a free call from any phone, including mobiles. The operator will ask, 'police, fire or ambulance?'. State the service you require and be prepared to give a brief description of the emergency, the address, or name of the nearest street corner/s. If you need to explain in your native language, ask for a translator.

The operator will contact emergency services while they are taking the first vital information from you. The operator may wish to keep you on the phone with them until emergency services arrive to assist. Remain calm, speak slowly and carefully. Although you may be covered by OSHC this only covers you for ambulance services that are considered an emergency. See more on page 90.

### Internet

Internet and wireless access is available at all campuses. Most on-campus accommodation and some off-campus accommodation will already have arrangements in place to enable internet access for students, although these may incur a charge. Please check with your accommodation provider. You can compare internet service providers at:

## **Voltages**

Domestic electricity in Australia is 240V/50Hz. The Australian three-pin outlet is different from most other countries, so you may need to purchase an adaptor plug for any electrical appliances (e.g. laptop computer) that you bring with you. Transformers and adaptors are easily obtained from electrical appliance stores or travel goods stores in Australia, and also from the bookshop in the Agora at the Melbourne Campus.

## Mobile phones and laptops

If you plan to bring your mobile phone with you to Australia, check that your mobile phone is compatible (supports GSM) and not blocked for international use or locked to the phone network you use in your home country. Students sometimes bring their own laptops with internal modems only to discover they are unable to use their modem in Australia.

### Banking

A number of personal identification documents are required to open bank accounts in Australia, which can include items that identify you as living in Australia. It is recommended that you open a bank account within six weeks of arrival in Australia as most banking institutions will accept just your passport and proof of date of arrival. After this time you will be required to take additional identification into a bank branch, such as your student card, CoE, credit card, or lease agreement – and other forms of identification with your name on it.

Banks are generally open Monday to Thursday, 9.30am – 4pm and Friday 9.30am – 5pm (closed public holidays). Some banks offer opening hours on Saturdays – check with your bank to confirm hours of operation.

Please refer to page 84 for a list of the banks and ATMs available on campus.

Money can be withdrawn from Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) 24 hours a day, and there is usually a daily withdrawal limit of around AUD\$800 – AUD\$1,000. We advise you to only carry as much cash as necessary for a few days at a time and always hide from view (cover the area with your hand) when entering your PIN (Personal Identification Number). ## CATCHING PUBLIC TRANSPORT TO UNIVERSITY

## **Melbourne Campus**

Travel is easy between central Melbourne (the city or CBD) and the Campus, which is located in the suburb of Bundoora. It takes about 40 minutes by car, 50 minutes by bus, and about 60 minutes by tram. Note that while the Central Business District (CBD) of Melbourne is compact, the suburban sprawl of Melbourne is very large and spans more than 85 km from one edge of the metropolitan fringe to the other. Below are some examples of distances between Bundoora and other Melbourne suburbs:

Bundoora to Dandenong - 42 km Bundoora to Clayton - 31 km Bundoora to Footscray - 37 km Bundoora to St Kilda - 26 km

latrobe.edu.au/about/maps maps.google.com.au whereis.com The Melbourne Campus is well serviced by the metropolitan public transport system, which incorporates train, tram and bus services. The number 86 tram and numbers 250 and 350 buses run direct from the CBD to the Melbourne Campus. Depending on where you join the services, the bus usually provides a quicker journey than the tram.

While there is no direct train service to the Campus, the South Morang and Hurstbridge lines include stops nearby, with a continuing bus service that can be accessed just outside the train stations of Reservoir (South Morang line), Macleod and Heidelberg (Hurstbridge line).

Check the transport maps at the Public Transport Victoria website below to be familiar with travel in zone 1 and 2 around Melbourne. In 2015, you can travel on trains, trams and buses across Zones 1 and 2, for the price of a Zone 1 fare. If you are only travelling in Zone 2, you can get the cheaper Zone 2 fare. Be aware that international students (with the exception of undergraduate. Diploma, exchange or undergraduate Australia Awards students that have been granted a concession card) are not eligible for concession prices on public transport in Victoria (see page 97). However, all undergraduate course work students are eligible to purchase a half price yearly pass called the IUSEPass. Expensive fines apply if you are caught travelling without a valid ticket. Train and tram services generally operate between 5am and 2am, Monday to Saturday. On Sunday, operating hours are between 8am and 1am.

On weekends, the NightRider buses provide a safe and inexpensive alternative for late night travel (every half hour between 1.30am to 4.30am on Saturdays and 1.30am to 5.30am on Sundays). ## BE SMART. SAFE. AND WELL -HAPPY AND HEALTHY!

Remember, this is a foreign country, a new environment and a different culture. Be aware that even simple tasks may be done very differently to the way you would do them back home. Take the time to inform yourself of potential risks around tasks you might do here for the first time (when signing contracts. visiting beaches or travelling to new areas).

It is important to note that there have been house fire incidents involving international students in Australia. Most of these fires are preventable.

Please take note of the following fire safety tips:

- Under Australian law, working smoke alarms must be fitted in all homes. Do not remove them, damage them, or remove the batteries. During a fire, toxic fumes may overcome you before you wake up. Ensure that you check to see that your smoke alarm is working: battery-operated alarms usually have a button that you can press to check. If your accommodation does not have smoke alarms installed speak to your landlord or report it to vour local council, shire or local fire station:

- The standard electricity voltage in Australia is 240V/50Hz. Electric plugs have three flat pins, one of which is an earth pin. You may need to buy an adaptor or have the plugs changed by a licensed practising electrician when you arrive (see also page 42). Do not use other plugs in Australian power sockets. Do not make any repairs or adjustments to electrical appliances. For information visit esv.vic.gov.au

## ENROLMENT AND ORIENTATION

## **ENROLMENT**

Enrolment is when you formally register into your course and choose any elective subjects. It is an important part of the University Orientation for international students. Visit: latrobe.edu.au/students/new-students/orientation

It is essential that you attend your Enrolment Session, where you will be enrolled into individual subjects. In preparation for your Enrolment Session, review your course structure and subjects at:

The enrolment process includes an information session followed by discussions with course advisers, subject selection and enrolment into these subjects. You will receive your La Trobe student identification (ID) card after the enrolment process.

## STEP I

## Attend your registration session

When you go into the registration venue, bring your original passport and visa or e-visa notification if you applied online.

If you have received a conditional offer (meaning your offer is dependent on certain requirements being met), check your Letter of Offer in case you need to provide original or certified copies of academic transcripts, or an English test score, to La Trobe International Admissions, to meet the conditions. You will not be allowed to activate your student account or enrol without meeting these conditions.

At registration you will also be able to activate your username and password to gain access to StudentOnLine and find out essential information on your specific Enrolment Session and University Orientation. If you still owe fees you will need to pay them before you can activate your student account and create your password. You cannot enrol in your subjects until you have registered.

**Important:** You can still enrol on the same day that you activate your username and password; however you can't access email until a day later due to the University's system requirements.

You will also need to provide information on your current residential address in Australia. Don't worry if it's not a permanent address, as you can make changes when you attend your Enrolment Session. It is a condition of your student visa that you let the University know your current address within seven days of arriving, and within seven days of each change of address.

## STEP 2

## Find your course details

Visit the University Handbook 2016 to find out more information on your course and available subjects.

You are encouraged to view the University Handbook to identify compulsory (core) subjects and when selecting elective subjects. Study Abroad and Exchange Students should have approved subjects listed on their Letter of Offer. The Handbook is online:

Carefully read the course and subject information you have received including information on applying for Advanced Standing (credit) for prior learning. Discuss any of your Advanced Standing arrangements at your Enrolment Session or by the second week of semester. See also a further explanation of Advanced Standing applications under Frequently Asked Questions on page 54.

If you are unsure about your subject selection, make sure to ask a course adviser at your Enrolment Session.

International students holding a student visa must be enrolled as full-time students unless they have the permission of their college to enrol into less than a full-time study load.

This is because international students must complete their course within the time specified on their Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE), which forms the basis of a Student Visa Application. Study Abroad and Exchange Students, Sponsored Students and recipients of US Financial Aid may have additional requirements if they wish to take less than a full-time study load.

## STEP 3

## Create your preliminary study timetable

You can search and view timetable information before you have enrolled using the Allocate Plus timetabling system online. You can search for subjects by:

- key words e.g. marketing
- full subject code e.g. ACC1AMD
- subject code/s prefix e.g. ACC Accounting or ACC2 - second-year accounting.

Subject codes are automatically post-fixed with a wild card, so ACC2 for example, will return all second-year undergraduate accounting subjects. You can also use the advanced filter to specify your campus, semester and activity type.

To find out more about a subject, you can click on the blue information icon below the subject name. This links to the online subject search, where you can find out more about the subject: latrobe.edu.au/students/subjects

Once you have searched for all of your subjects, select the subjects that you would like to view in a timetable and click 'Show Timetable'. Once you have created a preliminary timetable, you can either print or download it for your reference.

You don't need to be sure about which elective subjects you want to enrol in, as there is opportunity to speak to a course adviser during your Enrolment Session. However, we recommend you check if there are any timetable clashes with the subjects you have chosen for the semester. After you have confirmed your enrolment, you need to wait 24 hours before you can login Allocate Plus with your student identification (ID) number and password, and allocate yourself to activities. You can view your enrolled subjects, choose your preferred tutorial, laboratory times and create your personal study



timetable. You can find your student ID number on your Letter of Offer, on your Statement of Account (SoA) and on your student ID card.

If you are studying at the Melbourne, Franklin Street or City Campus and commencing at the start of a semester, look in the Orientation guide for International students for Timetable helper availability. Timetable helpers will help you to create your timetable if you are having trouble doing this yourself.

Timetable information is provisional and subject to change until the start of the academic year in Semester 1 (February).

Study Abroad and Exchange students must have their preliminary timetable worked out prior to their Enrolment Session.

You should check your timetable at least two weeks prior to the start of future semesters, in case there have been any changes. Tutorial class allocations usually take place during the first week of semester.

## STEP 4

## Attend your Enrolment Session and understand your tuition fees

Your Orientation schedule contains information about the date, time and place to enrol at La Trobe University. To check the location of your enrolment venue at your campus see: latrobe.edu.au/students/new-students/orientation

When you arrive at your Enrolment Session venue, course advisers from your college or school will assist you with subject selection. If you have any questions about the course, subjects, updating personal details or obtaining Advanced Standing, you can ask a course adviser.

When you come to enrol you will need:

- relevant, original or certified transcripts as well as the relevant course syllabus or course outline if you are applying for Advanced Standing (credit)
- preliminary course timetable (this is compulsory for Study Abroad and Exchange students)
- a pen.

## Note for students with a disability

You were billed for your first semester's tuition fees and paid for them when you accepted your offer to study at La Trobe University.

That first instalment is based on 60 credit points - most subjects at La Trobe are 15 credit points each. This means that any enrolment into subjects worth more or less than 60 credit points will alter your fees.

You will be notified by email when your first Statement of Account (SoA) is available on StudentOnLine. For new students, payment for full-year subjects is due in the semester of commencement. The exception is Study Abroad students who pay a flat-rate fee each semester – see FAQs page 57. The amount you paid to accept your offer is also shown as credit toward your fees. See your SoA for tuition fee due dates or speak to the staff at the Ask La Trobe Help Zone.

You can generate and print subsequent SoAs from StudentOnLine at any time. Methods of payment are listed on your SoA. In 2016, students will be billed for each subject two weeks before each subject's Census Date. The Census Date for each subject is set when one third of the subject has been delivered, and is the last date for students to withdraw and not incur fees for the subject (please see page 55 for information on changing your course). For subjects that are delivered over the whole of Semester 1 2016, the Census Date will be 29 March 2016 and for Semester 2 2016, it will be 23 August 2016.

## STEP 5

## Have your photo taken and collect your student identification card

You will be directed to the designated card station to have your photograph taken. For Melbourne and Bendigo students, your student identification card will be issued on the same day. Students at other campuses can collect their card from Student Administration during Orientation. Your card will be activated overnight before you can use it to gain access to facilities and services.

You can also upload your favourite photo and order your student ID card online. If you are a new student you will need to collect your student ID at campus because we need to see photo ID (e.g. passport) to verify your identify.

You will need a student ID card to access services on campus, such as the library, printing and photocopying, sitting an examination, and identifying your student status off campus.

## STEP 6

## Congratulations! You are now enrolled.

No matter when you arrive, make sure to attend the University Orientation on your campus to help you settle into life at La Trobe University. One of your first points of contact at university is now ASK La Trobe. You can also visit La Trobe International and make an appointment with an International Student Services Coordinator to discuss any issues regarding settling in, your visa conditions and adjusting to life in Australia (see our contact details on page 112).

## **UNIVERSITY ORIENTATION**

Success in your studies can depend on how well you adjust to studying and living in Australia. Students who attend their introductory programs are more likely to succeed. The University Orientation has been specifically designed to help you make a smooth transition to life and study at La Trobe. The University Orientation is compulsory for all new international students and provides important information and social activities specific to your needs. Orientation is a program designed for all students at La Trobe University and will enable you to make important connections with your peers, different networks and the campus community.

You can prepare for university life and study by checking out the Ready4Uni website where you will find out about Orientation, campus services and how to make the most of your first few weeks.

To give yourself the best chance at succeeding in your studies, make sure you attend as many Orientation sessions as possible. The presenters of each session are experienced in their field and are the best people to talk to and to ask questions.

Attending the University Orientation is your chance to get the best information – all in one convenient place! It's also an invaluable chance to make friends. Don't underestimate the importance of attendance; when classes start and students get busy, you might find it harder to make connections among your classmates – having people who know you from the beginning can make all the difference to settling in. Students who do not attend University Orientation sessions usually find themselves at a disadvantage and are less likely to succeed.

You should carefully check the Orientation website for details of compulsory sessions and additional activities at your campus.

## Melbourne and Franklin Street campuses

The University Orientation aims to assist you during your first days and weeks in Melbourne. Information regarding subject selection and enrolment is also provided, including information sessions with course advisers.

On the first day of Orientation (O-week) you will meet one of the Connect Volunteers who assist new students to transition to university life. They can also provide support for new students across the first six weeks of semester.

There is information on accommodation, Australian culture, finding work, and details on subject selection and enrolment. This includes an information session and discussions with course advisers. You'll also meet an International Student Host and our International Student Services Coordinator at the Need to Know session.

## LA TROBE USERNAME AND PASSWORD

All La Trobe students receive a username and password to access the University internet system and personal student account, which includes various study tools such as the Learning Management System (LMS), student email, Library, Turnitin and StudentOnLine.

You will be able to activate your student account and create your password when you register with La Trobe International.

Please note that the University expects you will have read any email we send to your student email address. It is your responsibility to check your student email regularly, both during semester and breaks, for important information and official notifications. We recommend you set up an email function that automatically forwards University emails to your personal email address (e.g. Gmail or Hotmail). You may also receive some important mail at your home address, so it's important to keep your postal address up to date.

## ENROLMENT CONDITIONS FOR STUDY ABROAD AND EXCHANGE STUDENTS

Attend the relevant Enrolment Session listed in your University Orientation guide, where representatives from your college will be available.

Bring along your most recent transcript, as well as a copy of your La Trobe University Letter of Offer to your Enrolment Session.

Course advisers will be available to discuss and approve any additional subjects you would like to add to your semester enrolment. If there are prerequisites required for the additional subjects, make sure you bring along any supporting documentation (e.g. syllabi) from subjects you have completed.

Remember, you must create your preliminary personal study timetable before you attend your Enrolment Session. This ensures any potential timetable clashes are resolved during enrolment. On the Melbourne Campus a Timetable Helper is available to help you during the University Orientation.

Important! Ensure you are enrolled in a full-time credit load. At La Trobe, full time means between 45 and 60 credit points. Students requiring to "overload" (take a maximum of 75 credit points to meet their home university requirements) need to seek permission from their college prior to enrolment. It is your responsibility to ensure you enrol in a correct La Trobe University credit load, as well as meet your home university's requirements.

It is your responsibility to enrol appropriately if you intend to apply for any post-study visas after you have completed your course. For further information you can go to the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) website at: border.gov.au

The University is obligated to notify DIBP of any changes made to the duration of your course (e.g. if you are granted significant Advanced Standing after your student visa has been granted).

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

If you have further questions or concerns, read on for some answers!

## How do I apply for Advanced Standing (credit)?

If you have already received Advanced Standing for previous studies, you would have received a letter from your relevant college with your Letter of Offer. If the offer is conditional. you must provide evidence that you have satisfactorily met the condition/s prior to or at the time of accepting your offer. The course duration shown on your Letter of Offer will reflect the amount of Advanced Standing received. If you did not request an assessment of Advanced Standing at the time you submitted your application for admission and you now wish to apply for Advanced Standing (on the basis of previous studies), you must apply for it at your Enrolment Session. You can also make an appointment with the relevant course adviser within the first two weeks of your course commencement date. You need to supply official evidence of having completed equivalent study acceptable to the college.

## What if I need more information about my course?

If you have questions about your course that cannot wait until your Enrolment Session, call the University and speak with a course adviser. You can contact the Ask La Trobe Help Zone first to be put in touch with the appropriate person, or connect with us and ask a question on Facebook.

## How do I change my course?

## Changing your course before or after you have enrolled

If you want to change your course after you have arrived and before your Enrolment Session, you will need to complete a Request for a Change of Course Preference Form. If you want to change your course after you have enrolled, you will need to complete an Application for Course Transfer. Both forms are available from LTI.

Your application will need to then be reassessed by LTI and the appropriate college. Please note that not all applicants are eligible for a change of preference or course transfer.

As this process can take up to two weeks, you are advised to attend all classes for the course that you were initially accepted into. You will be advised by email if your application has been successful.

## What if I am going to arrive after enrolment?

Entry into your course is not guaranteed if you cannot attend the first day of scheduled classes. Therefore, you must apply for an extension if you are going to arrive later.

The decision to grant an extension is determined by your college and cannot be guaranteed. Contact your agent to see if you are eligible for an extension or contact LTI:

There are no extensions for some courses such as the Master of Business Administration (MBA).

Arriving late means you will be missing classes and will have to catch-up on the content you have missed. You will also miss the University Orientation, which is crucial in helping students adjust to life and study in an Australian

university. Late arrival to a course is not an eligible reason for Special Consideration (see page 72) during exams or later studies. Your first semester is usually the hardest as you will be undergoing a big transition to life in Australia and studies at La Trobe University. To achieve the best chance at success, we recommend you arrive at least one day before your scheduled registration.

## Plan in advance and arrive early to allow yourself time to adapt to leaving your home country and to adjust to the new environment you will encounter in Australia.

However, if you happen to arrive after enrolment, you must still register your arrival at LTI – please ensure that you have your passport and a copy of your e-visa (if it's not attached to your passport).

You will then receive information on how to enrol and be advised of any additional Enrolment Sessions, and where you should go to enrol. It is very important that you enrol as soon as possible so that you can access facilities and services on campus. Late enrolment may result in some subjects being unavailable, as they have filled their quota.

It may also mean you cannot sign up for your preferred laboratory, tutorial or practicum.

You must start attending classes as soon as you can. In some cases this means that you may start classes before you are officially enrolled in your subjects.

## What if I enrol, then change my mind about studying?

If you enrol in a course at La Trobe University and subsequently decide you do not want to study, it is important you notify the University in writing as soon as possible by filling out a Discontinuation of Enrolment Form.

## Seek advice

Discuss your decision with a course adviser from your college or with staff from International Student Services at LTI before you make the final decision to discontinue your course (see page 112 for contact details). LTI is obliged to report your discontinuation of studies to the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP): this means your CoE is cancelled. You will be advised to attend a DIBP office within 28 days to either present a new CoE for alternative study, to apply for a new visa, or to leave the country. If you intend to study elsewhere in Australia, and are within the first six months of your principal course, you will also require a Letter of Release. See 'How do I change my university or tertiary institution?' on page 56.

### Refunds

If you are eligible for a refund under the La Trobe University Refund Policy, you must also complete an Application for Refund Form available at LTI or at:

It is important to remember that if you do not formally discontinue your Enrolment by the Census Dates for your subjects, you will not receive a refund for any tuition fees paid for that semester. If you discontinue your course before the Census Date, in your first semester of study, you are only eligible to receive a refund of half of your deposit. The Census Date for each subject you are enrolled in is indicated on your Statement of Account. See more on page 49.



## How do I change my university or tertiary institution?

If you have enrolled in your course at La Trobe University you must officially discontinue your studies. If you hold a student visa and have not yet enrolled, you still require a Letter of Release during the first six months of your principal course before you accept an offer from another University. If you discontinue your studies before your results are released, you will not receive results for any completed assessments, so you might consider waiting until after your results to change your university.

## **OUR OBLIGATIONS**

We are obliged to notify the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) if you breach any visa conditions, change your course, defer prior to commencement, temporarily suspend, take a leave of absence, discontinue your studies or make any changes affecting the duration of your study. ## If you want to change universities within the first six months of your principal course (based on the date on your CoE)

If you want to continue to study in Australia, you will need to apply for a Letter of Release from La Trobe International.

To apply, you need to complete a Request for a Letter of Release Form (this form is available at LTI), together with a letter explaining why you want to be released. If you have completed one full semester of study, but less than six months of your course, this is all LTI will require. If you haven't completed one full semester of study, you will need to provide a copy of your Letter of Offer or CoE (Confirmation of Enrolment) from the institution you wish to attend, as well as any other evidence that supports your application.

If you are under 18 years of age, you will need the written consent of your parent or legal custodian. If you are a Sponsored Student we may require written permission from your sponsor to provide you with a Letter of Release (see page 18). You are advised to continue to attend all scheduled classes, until a decision is made on your application. You will receive a response from La Trobe, International, within ten working days from the date of your application. If La Trobe agrees for you to be released from your La Trobe course, you will need to complete a Discontinuation of Enrolment Form and have this approved by LTI and your college. There is no fee charged for a Letter of Release.

## If you want to change universities after the first six months of your principal course

You do not need a Letter of Release from La Trobe University once you have completed the first six months of your principal course. You will need to complete a Discontinuation of Enrolment Form and have it approved by LTI and your college. LTI will not approve a Discontinuation of Enrolment Form if you have overdue fees.

## Leaving La Trobe University

Once we have approved your discontinuation we will report to DIBP that you are no longer studying at La Trobe University and your CoE will be cancelled. It is your responsibility to ensure that DIBP is aware of your new education provider and of the course you have chosen.

## Commencing with a new education provider

If you are granted a Letter of Release, you will need to give it to your new education provider. Once they have issued you with a new CoE you should take that into DIBP. If your new course is in a different student visa subclass to your course at La Trobe University, you may be required to apply for a new student visa.

You are strongly advised to report to a DIBP office with your new CoE within 28 days of discontinuing your studies at La Trobe University.

## What if I don't understand some of the requirements of my course?

See Student Learning Unit on page 70. You should also ensure you have read your subject guides and attended all your classes. Each college provides a very useful Survival Guide, packed with important information (see page 68).

## How do I determine if I am a Study Abroad or an Exchange Student?

Study Abroad students take only one or two semesters at La Trobe. While doing so they defer from studies at their home institution and pay international tuition fees to La Trobe University. Exchange students study at La Trobe for only one or two semesters and come from a La Trobe University exchange partner institution: they remain enrolled at their home institution and do not pay tuition fees to La Trobe University.

## How do I drop or add subjects after enrolment?

- Seek approval from your college or course coordinator.
- Log on to StudentOnLine.
- If StudentOnLine is unavailable, submit a Variation of Enrolment Form to ASK La Trobe.
- If you do not get approval to 'underload' and subsequently require a new CoE to apply for a new student visa, your application for a new CoE may be denied.

## What if I need to take time off from my studies?

If you wish to apply for a Leave of Absence, you should discuss your circumstances with International Student Services at La Trobe International.

You may be granted a Leave of Absence for compelling or compassionate circumstances for up to one year. If you are granted leave, the University must notify the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) of the changes in your enrolment. The reason for taking leave may affect your student visa status. see:

## Am I a Sponsored Student?

Sponsored Students receive financial assistance from an organisation (not private individuals or relatives) to study at La Trobe University. Such organisations have a billing arrangement with La Trobe University. If you receive your funds directly from an organisation, and then pay your own tuition fees, you are not classified as a Sponsored Student. Sponsored programs are administered by the Sponsored Programs Team at La Trobe International (LTI). See also information on Sponsored Students on pages 18.

## Okay, I am a Sponsored Student - so how do I pay my fees?

Sponsored Students will receive an email notification of their La Trobe University Statement of Account (SoA) – but it will have a zero balance in the student payment section. The tuition fees owing will appear in the sponsor payment column. The University will bill your sponsor twice a year for your fees, in accordance with our sponsor agreement. If your SoA does not have a sponsor payment section, please email the Sponsored Programs Team, see page 18.

## What if I need a Working with Children (WWC) Check and a National Police Check?

Students who are involved in child-related work as part of their course must comply with the *Working with Children Act 2005*. The Act affects students who undertake practical training in clinical or professional placements, for example a student nurse or student teacher. Students undertaking duties as Residential Assistants may also be required to obtain a WWC Check.

The Department of Justice does not impose a charge for student volunteers applying for a WWC Check. However, if a student is undertaking child-related work as a paid employee, a charge will apply.

In addition, students who undertake clinical and professional placements in their course will be required to obtain a National Police Check. As the check is valid for 12 months only, students are expected to obtain a new clearance in each year of professional placements in their course.

## Academic calendar

The La Trobe University academic year is divided into two main semesters, with an additional Summer Semester. We have specified in the calendar the last possible day that you may have to sit an exam, but you may finish exams before this date. Please do not book any flights until you know when all your exams are scheduled.

Students should also note that supplementary and special examinations may take place in January, early February, late July and early August.

Some courses may have different commencement dates or non-standard start dates. Please refer to your Letter of Offer for your exact start date when booking flights or making holiday arrangements.

The dates for International Registration, Enrolment and University Orientation are subject to change. Regularly check our website, and correspondence from La Trobe University, for confirmation of dates.

## Non-standard teaching periods 2016

The University also delivers a number of non-standard teaching periods through external providers or to meet special course requirements.

Non-standard teaching periods appear in the form WXXYY, for example W0622.

These indicate the whole weeks of the teaching period, and run from the first Monday to the last Sunday.

E.g. W0621 has a teaching period that begins on the first day of the sixth whole week in 2016 (Monday 1 February) and finishes on the last day of the twenty-second whole week in 2016 (Sunday 29 May).

## **WORK AND TAXATION**

## Student visa conditions

For other information on student visa conditions refer to pages 8 and 9 in the Preparing for departure section of this guide.

International students can work a maximum of 40 hours per fortnight during semester, including the entire advertised exam period. Work that is a formal, registered part of a course is not included in the 40-hour limit. If students do voluntary or unpaid work, it is also excluded from the 40-hour limit when:

- it is of benefit to the community
- the work is for a non-profit organisation
- it is a designated and genuine volunteer position with no remuneration, either in cash or in kind (except for accommodation).

Students can also work unlimited hours during official university vacations once they have commenced their course in Australia. This includes any employment, volunteer work or work placement.

In some university courses, study demands allow little time for employment. Part-time work and vacation work are not always available and students should not depend on this form of income to cover living expenses or tuition fees. For up-to-date information on working while studying, visit:

## Research candidates

Holders of a subclass 574 (Postgraduate Research Visa) who have commenced their Master's by Research or Doctorate in Australia, have no limit on the number of hours they can work (but can only work a maximum of 40 hours per fortnight during any preliminary course e.g. ELICOS).

Students studying a Master's by Research or Doctor of Philosophy have rules of candidature that permit them to work only eight hours per week, Monday to Friday, between the hours of 9am and 5pm.

## Students with families

Dependant family members:

- can work up to 40 hours per fortnight at all times
- have unlimited work rights if they are dependant family members of the student visa holder who studies a Master's or Doctoral program and holds a Subclass 573 (Higher Education sector), 574 (Postgraduate Research Visa) or 576 (Foreign Affairs/ Defence Scholarship) student visa
- must not start work until the student visa holder has commenced their course in Australia

In 2015, Australia's minimum wage was AUD\$17.29 per hour. Employers and employees cannot have a rate of pay that is less than the applicable minimum wage. An employee may also be entitled to allowances or loadings, depending on their job and hours of work (e.g. a casual employee may be entitled to a casual loading). Your minimum rights and work conditions may be set by an award or workplace agreement. If you are unsure, check rules and work conditions with the Fair Work Ombudsman before signing any contract or workplace agreement.

**Important!** In Australia, if you work and do not provide your employer with a Tax File Number (TFN), you may be taxed at the highest rate of approximately 48.5 per cent. Please see the Tax File Number section on page 84.

## INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS' RIGHTS

Australia provides the world's most rigorous protection for international students through the *Education Services for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act 2000*, ensuring you receive a quality education and protection as a consumer.

The ESOS Act protects your rights as a student, sets out the standards that Australian education providers must obey when offering education services to overseas students, and also outlines your responsibilities as an overseas student.

## **HEALTH INSURANCE**

## Overseas Student Health Cover

As a condition of a student visa, all international students must have Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the duration of their visa.

OSHC offers medical and hospital cover for international students and their dependants while they are in Australia – it is a similar standard of cover provided to Australian citizens under the public Medicare system.



We strongly recommend you read your OSHC Essentials policy and what it covers, as there are some exclusions such as pre-existing illnesses. If you do require treatment you may also be required to pay up-front and then claim back any refunds that you are entitled to.

La Trobe University currently has an agreement with Allianz Global Assistance, a private health fund, for the provision of OSHC. If you have purchased your OSHC through Allianz Global Assistance you will be covered from the moment you enter Australia, even though you have not yet obtained your membership card.

You will be given information on how to get your membership card and on making claims during University Orientation. Alternatively see Allianz Global Assistance representatives at the Melbourne Campus on Monday to Thursday from 10am to 4pm at La Trobe International.

OSHC by Allianz Global Assistance offers a 24-hour emergency helpline, including an interpreting service, legal advice and medical assistance (some information is provided in other languages):

Only student visa holders are eligible for OSHC insurance.

## Exceptions

Some countries have a Reciprocal Health Care Agreement with Australia. If you are from the United Kingdom, Sweden, the Netherlands, Belgium, Slovenia, or Italy you have access to some health cover but you still have to have OSHC (except Belgian students). You will need to visit a Medicare Australia office with your passport and visa to get a Reciprocal Health Care Card.

All Belgian students do not require OSHC. OSHC by Allianz Global Assistance is not required for Norwegian students who are covered by the Norwegian National Insurance Scheme. Swedish students, who are covered by the National Board of Student Aid or by Kammarkollegiet also do not need to take out OSHC. However, Swedish students not covered by the Swedish National Board of Student Aid must purchase OSHC by Allianz Global Assistance to meet their student visa requirements.

## Overseas Visitor Health Cover (OVHC)

Allianz Global Assistance OVHC is medical insurance designed for visitors and temporary residents. The Australian Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) requires all holders of a temporary residency visa to maintain OVHC during their entire stay in Australia.

The health cover subsidises the cost of hospital medical treatments, prescription medicines, emergency ambulance transport and surgically implanted prostheses. More details:

## Student Loan Fund

La Trobe University provides an interest-free loan and grant scheme for current students in financial need. The loan support must be related to students' needs to complete their studies. Loan amounts greater than AUD\$800 require an Australian guarantor, and generally you cannot receive a loan or grant to pay your tuition fees. In the case of urgent need in accordance with University policies, students may also apply for Emergency Aid (up to AUD\$200) or a loan or grant (up to AUD\$4,000). 

## LEARNING STYLES AND EXPECTATIONS

Learning styles can vary greatly across different countries. University study in Australia requires independent thought and often autonomous work. Even Australian students coming to university for the first time find the demands quite different to their previous learning environments.

It is important to investigate how La Trobe University's academic culture may vary from your own, as this will increase your chances of achieving better results. Your first assessment may be due in the early weeks of the semester. To help you prepare for study in Australia, attend the University Orientation (see page 51) where several sessions are offered to help with your transition into the demands of Australian university life. Read about the Student Learning Unit on page 70 and also visit:

Each college provides a first-year *Survival Guide* that includes useful information on learning, lectures and tutorials, planning your study, paraphrasing and referencing and assessment tasks, plus other specific topics such as communication skills, and writing.

### Lectures

Lectures present information and concepts that are central to the course. Lecture material is important to assignments and exams.

To increase your understanding and retention of knowledge, it is important to read the study material before lectures and review your notes. Try to read any supplementary material within 24 hours after lectures, and rewrite your notes. In Australia, you will be expected to participate in class discussions, ask questions, and demonstrate that you understand the material covered in lectures, not just that you can memorise the material.

## **Tutorials and seminars**

These are similar to discussion groups led by an academic teacher, speaker, or a student who has researched a particular topic.

The style can vary greatly between structured formats with learning aims being clear from the outset, or they can be more free-flowing – giving students the opportunity to explore ideas.

Students can ask questions during sessions. Tutorials and seminars are meant to be interactive, and are helpful in confirming important points given in lectures or in clarifying lecture material and assignments.

### Assessment

All subjects have different methods of assessment. Some place greater emphasis on exams while others focus on essays and assignments. Some subjects rely on the completion of individual assessments while others may include a semester-long group assessment. Understanding how your subjects are assessed may help you to achieve better results. Subject outlines give you the percentage that each assessment is worth to your final result (as do your Subject Guides, which you can find on the LMS after enrolment). Visit:

### Time management

Managing your time between work, study and your personal life is your responsibility. However, there are University services that can assist you in adjusting to the demands of student life, and are highly recommended when unexpected events may impact on your life.

In particular, International Student Services, the Counselling Service and the Student Learning Unit on page 70, can all help.

Having a realistic schedule for yourself throughout the semester can benefit your results and lower your stress levels.

## **Plagiarism**

Plagiarism is using other people's ideas – either their exact words or a paraphrase – without referencing to inform the reader where these original ideas came from. These ideas could be from the internet, in books, journal articles, newspapers, television, radio or any spoken or written text. While in some academic cultures it is not necessary to tell your reader that you are using other people's ideas and/or words (by referencing), this is not the case in Australia.

Plagiarising somebody else's work (failing to acknowledge their ideas or words) and pretending it is your own – including copying another student's work – is considered cheating and there are serious consequences.

Consult with your college, school office or lecturers for information on the preferred referencing style. Or read your relevant *Survival Guide* (see opposite page), which explains how to avoid plagiarism, and gives lots of examples on how to reference properly. ## The Academic Integrity Module (AIM)

La Trobe University has created an Academic Integrity Module (AIM) on its Learning Management System (LMS). AIM provides important information to help you understand and avoid academic misconduct. It guides you through your responsibilities, provides examples of academic misconduct, shows you where to find useful information and gives referencing styles specific to your course.

All new undergraduate and postgraduate coursework students need to complete AIM as part of their course requirements.

You can complete the module at your own pace. Your results are recorded on your academic transcript.

AIM takes about an hour to complete depending on your level of knowledge. You can log into the LMS and complete AIM as soon as you receive your student username and password – you do not need to wait for the start of semester.

You should complete this module no later than the end of the second week of your first semester. You may receive a reminder in your La Trobe student email if you have not completed the module within this timeframe. If you have any questions, you should see your first-year coordinator or course coordinator at your college. Further information is available at: latrobe.edu.au/students/learning

## Academic adjustment

Students at La Trobe University can develop their academic skills through online resources in areas such as writing, reading, note-taking, and presentations. You should read your college *Survival Guide*, and then discuss any study problems with your tutors and lecturers to further understand the requirements of your course.

Peer Learning Advisers (PLAs) are experienced La Trobe students who work on all campuses to support your studies. Check out their availability timetable and where to find PLAs on your campus at:

## **Student Learning Unit**

The Student Learning Unit works closely with teaching staff in the colleges to ensure that La Trobe students – including those from non-English speaking backgrounds – receive the academic support they need to succeed. Core academic skills include essay and report writing, preparation for oral presentations, and numeracy skills.

Unit staff assist in course and subject design, advise on teaching strategies, and teach special subjects, tutorials and workshops.

The Unit also produces online learning resources, delivers professional development for academics, trains student academic mentors, and supports student learning in many other ways. #### **ACADEMIC POLICIES**

## Academic Progress Monitoring and Intervention Policy

The University will send you official progress monitoring correspondence if you fail one subject or more. This correspondence will outline support services you can access to improve your marks and instruct you on what action you should take. You may receive an At Risk Letter, if you:

- fail 50 per cent or more of your total enrolment for a progression period (1 January to 30 June, and 1 July to 31 December each year)
- fail a subject for a second or subsequent time
- fail for the first time in any workplace-based subject as listed from time-to-time by the University
- fail to meet any conditions previously imposed on your enrolment by a college.

If you receive an At Risk letter, you must meet with your relevant course coordinator, or nominee, as specified in the letter, to discuss your lack of progress and your enrolment.

At this meeting you will together complete an Agreed Progression Plan, with reasons for your unsatisfactory academic progress, and the recommended steps you should take to address the issues.

If you continue to maintain unsatisfactory academic progress in subsequent progression periods, you may be issued with an Unsatisfactory Progress Committee letter (UPC). You must make an appointment (contact details included in the letter) or you will be excluded or your case will be assessed in absentia provided that you advised that you cannot attend.

You will receive both an email and registered mail with instructions on how to prepare your UPC meeting. Read these carefully and make sure you understand the instructions and the timelines you have been given. We strongly recommend you seek advice from a Student Advocate or from International Student Services at La Trobe International before you attend the meeting with the Unsatisfactory Progress Committee (see under Student advocates on the next page).

The University will review your unsatisfactory academic progress. You can appeal to the University Appeals Committee if a decision is made to exclude you.

If you do not appeal a decision to exclude you, after 20 working days the University will report you to the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) for having failed to meet course progress requirements. If you do appeal to the University Appeals Committee but are unsuccessful, after 20 working days the University will report you to the DIBP for having failed to meet course progress requirements.

As part of this process, you will be sent a letter informing you to go to a DIBP office within 28 days, with photo identification. Failure to do this may result in your visa being cancelled. It is your right to make a complaint to the Victorian Ombudsman. You would need to do this within the 20 working days, and provide La Trobe International with your complaint number to avoid being reported to DIBP.

#### Special consideration

To apply for special consideration, you have to demonstrate that your illness or other compelling or compassionate circumstances adversely affected your performance in an assessment task or examination.

All actions taken under academic regulations, by the University or by students, are subject to strict time limits. Ensure that you take any action within the stated timeframes. If you are granted special consideration, you may receive extra time for your assignment, a variation to your marks or you may have to sit a supplementary examination.

#### COMPUTER AND EMAIL FACILITIES

#### TAX FILE NUMBER (TFN)

A TFN is allocated to each taxpayer in Australia for taxation purposes. International students whose course of study is six months or longer and who are visa holders with work rights can apply for their TFN online prior to their departure: they are also considered an Australian resident for tax purposes.

This means you're not required to pay tax on the first AUD\$18,200 (2015 rate, subject to change) you earn in a calendar year. Your employer will deduct tax from your pay during each pay period. However, tax on earnings of up to AUD\$18,200 will be refunded to you at the end of the financial year (30 June) when you submit a tax return.

Water-saving rules apply in regional and rural Victoria and there are usually water restrictions in metropolitan Melbourne. Everyone must try to save water at home, study or work. Please minimise your water use by:

- reporting any leaky taps to your landlord or your accommodation representative.

## INTERNET, TELEPHONE AND POSTAL SERVICES

#### Internet

Internet access – including an ever-expanding wireless network – is available at all La Trobe campuses.

During Orientation, free wireless internet is provided to all students.

At the Melbourne Campus, Borchardt Library, and at the Bendigo Campus, Heyward Library, commencing students can use computers prior to activating their student account.

New students at the Albury-Wodonga Campus can obtain a temporary computer password from International Student Services if they arrive early – however this may take one to two business days. In addition, if you don't have your own notebook or laptop, internet cafés are located off the Albury-Wodonga Campus.

Most on-campus accommodation and some off-campus accommodation providers enable internet access for students, although there may be a charge. Check with your accommodation provider. You can compare internet service providers at:

#### Telephone

Setting up a fixed home phone line can cost a connection fee, plus a minimum monthly rental charge. If you are living in shared accommodation, ensure your housemates' names are also registered as users on the phone account, otherwise you will be the only one legally liable to pay the bill.

#### International phone calls

International calls can be made direct from all phones in Australia, including payphones. Simply dial the following:

- the international access code (0011)
- your country code (if you are unsure of your home country's code, call 1225 for information)
- the area code for your city remember not to dial the first zero
- the phone number you are dialling.

International calls are timed and charged according to the destination, the time of day and day of the week. Weekend rates can be much cheaper. Consider buying pre-paid international phone cards that usually offer much cheaper rates and are available from newsagencies, delicatessens, milk bars and post offices.

#### Local and regional phone calls

Higher rates apply to calls made to or from metropolitan areas, to regional areas in Victoria, or to other states in Australia, including between Melbourne and Bendigo, Albury-Wodonga, Mildura and Shepparton. These calls, named STD calls, are timed and charged at a minimum of AUD\$.20c per minute plus a connection fee of AUD\$.50c. Cheaper STD rates are generally offered in evenings and on weekends, however telephone companies offer a variety of phone plans and rates.

All local calls are untimed and cost at least AUD\$.50c (more from public phones).

You can save money by bundling a VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) phone connection with broadband internet. VoIP allows you to use the internet to make and receive phone calls. You can also use Skype online.

The Yellow Pages and White Pages are Australian telephone directories. The Yellow Pages lists business telephone numbers.

The White Pages lists residential and business telephone numbers in Australia and also Federal and State government departments.

#### Mobile phones

We suggest you talk to students who have been in Australia for a while for tips on the best phone company and network. Some phone companies will not supply services to people who are temporary residents in Australia, but you can always use a pre-paid phone system. This also ensures that you will avoid an unexpectedly high mobile phone bill. Make sure you read all the clauses and terms and conditions before signing a phone contract. Pre-paid mobile phone cards may be purchased at a number of retail outlets.

#### Postal services

Postal offices are open from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday and some are open on Saturday mornings. Mail is delivered once a day on weekdays only. Mail within Australia has a flat rate of postage AUD\$.70c (2015 price, subject to change) for a standard letter. International mail charges are calculated by weight, size, destination and mode of delivery. Some utility bills may be paid at the post office. At the Melbourne Campus, a post office is located at the ground floor, Agora East Building. You can also search for local post offices and find out their opening hours at:

#### SOCIAL CUSTOMS AND CONVENTIONS

#### Australian values

Australian society is made up of people from over 210 different nationalities, so it is difficult to define what is 'typical' in Australian culture or social customs. There are, however, some values most Australians consider important. Most Australians strongly value our society's tolerance of different religions and cultures, plus our freedom of speech and democratic rights. Australians also consider it important that people will be given a 'fair go'; that is, you will be treated equitably. Australia is frequently described as an 'egalitarian' society. This means that class divisions are not so entrenched in Australia as in some other countries.

People in Australia generally treat each other in the same way regardless of what part of society they come from. La Trobe University, for example, has its own advocates, complaints and grievance procedures, academic progress committees and an ombudsman to give

students an opportunity to explain their own version of events or situations and to ensure fairness and equality (see the information under Academic policies from page 71).

#### Your own customs

In comparison to many other countries, Australia and, especially Melbourne, is notable for its diversity and multiculturalism. Your own customs can be maintained within the community and most Australians will understand your reasons for not adopting certain local customs if they are different from your own.

You will find that invitations to social events may request that you notify your host of any special dietary requirements. If this is not mentioned or requested, it is still acceptable to politely mention your dietary requirements.

If your religion prohibits you from eating certain foods or drinking alcohol, you can maintain these customs.

#### Physical contact

Within families and close circles of friends, women will often greet other members (male and female) with a kiss on the cheek (and expect one in return). Men will often greet each other by shaking hands. The same applies when saying goodbye. Australian women display affection more openly and this may take the form of hugging or greeting family and friends with a kiss on the cheek.

Signs of affection between men and women are common and it is commonplace to see couples, and sometimes same-sex couples, holding hands, walking arm-in-arm or kissing in public.

While behaviour varies between cultural groups, Australian men generally do not openly display strong affection for male friends. It is

not common to see Australian men showing affection towards each other in public (e.g. hugging, kissing, linking arms), even if they are very close friends. The exceptions to this might be between homosexual men, men playing sport (where it is common to see players hugging or patting each other on the back) and at family gatherings. Displays of affection are not uncommon between homosexual partners, particularly in capital cities. Homosexuality is legal in Australia.

#### **Invitations and appointments**

In Australia it is considered impolite not to keep an appointment once you have accepted an invitation. If you do not wish to accept an invitation, the custom is to say so politely and immediately. If you are unable to meet a professional appointment, such as with a doctor or member of university staff, it is necessary to call and either cancel or reschedule the appointment (many medical centres and other services charge cancellation fees if you don't contact them in advance to cancel an appointment). Invitations may include dinner (sometimes called 'tea') at someone's house, a party at someone's house, or dinner or drinks at a hotel (pub), bar, restaurant or café.

Also, when someone invites you out to dinner at a café or restaurant, generally everyone pays for their own meal, or it's divided equally (this is sometimes referred to as 'splitting the bill').

If you are invited to someone's house it is customary (but not compulsory) to bring a small contribution such as a bottle of wine, or a box of chocolates or sweets. If you are asked to 'bring a plate', this means a plate of food to be shared by everyone. After a meal at someone's house it is polite to offer to help in some way such as washing some of the dishes.

In Victoria, smoking is prohibited in restaurants, bars, pubs or in any public buildings, which includes all of La Trobe University buildings (similar regulations apply in New South Wales). Smoking is no longer allowed on all La Trobe campuses, however designated smoking bays have been set up in the meantime while the University-wide smoking ban is implemented. Restaurants in Victoria are either licensed (allowed by law to sell alcohol with meals) or 'BYO' (Bring Your Own). This allows you to bring your own alcohol but first check with the restaurant if beer/wine, or both, are allowed, and if there is a charge.

Australians generally value their personal home life and, while they are usually pleased to have visitors, unless you've known the person for some time it's best to telephone before visiting. Also read page 11 for more information on Australian society.

#### **HEALTH AND WELLNESS**

We encourage students to have a healthy lifestyle – not only in terms of physical health, but also mentally, socially, emotionally, and spiritually. Here are some health tips:

- Try not to skip any meals. Many students don't eat breakfast but this is the most important meal of the day. We know that students perform better if they have eaten breakfast.
- Eat a well-balanced diet with plenty of fresh vegetables, fruit, legumes (e.g. lentils, chickpeas) and cereals, a moderate amount of lean meat, poultry or fish (if you're not

a vegetarian), and some milk, cheese and yoghurt or similar alternatives. Avoid fatty, sugary foods and takeaway food. Consult the following website for nutrition tips: nutritionaustralia.org

#### Bring a healthy lunch or nutritious snacks.

- Drink plenty of water. Tap water is of a high quality in Australia.
- Quit smoking. The University is encouraging students who smoke to quit the habit, and smoking is only allowed at currently designated smoking bays at all campuses: latrobe.edu.au/about/vision/our-campusesand-communities/smoke-free-la-trobe
- If you are feeling stressed from your studies, take a short break, talk to a friend, phone or Skype family at home, or do some exercise.
- Aim for a minimum of seven or eight hours sleep most nights.
- If you feel anxious or flat, unhappy or sad or have difficulty sleeping for several weeks, make an appointment with the free University counselling service. You will gain a mentor, improve your studies – and most importantly – develop new skills for enjoying life: latrobe.edu.au/students/counselling

#### **ACCESSING MEDICAL SERVICES**

In the first few weeks after your arrival, we recommend you find a medical clinic close to your campus or accommodation. Register yourself at the clinic, and keep a note of

their contact details so you can easily make an appointment when you need to do so.

The OSHC website has a useful 'Find a doctor' function. To locate one near you visit: oshcallianzassistance.com.au/member\_student/medical\_providers.aspx

In Australia, doctors are also called GPs (General Practitioners). A doctor works in a Medical Centre, Surgery, Clinic or Practice. A pharmacy (drug store) can also be called a chemist.

There is a shortage of doctors in many areas, so you may be unable to register with the doctor nearest to you. You may find it is easier to get an appointment if you are prepared to see any of the doctors in a Medical Centre.

Unless it is an emergency, consult a doctor or GP in a clinic, not in a hospital. You can call the OSHC emergency helpline to talk to a medical professional 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Interpreting and legal services are also available by calling this number:

You can also telephone the Victorian Nurseon-Call service to get immediate health advice from registered nurses, 24 hours a day. You can call this number when you think you may be developing a non-critical medical condition and want advice on what to do:

If you are unable to get an appointment with a doctor and are in urgent need of medical treatment, you can go to the Accident and Emergency Department of a public hospital. This department is open 24 hours a day and specialises in emergency medicine. Depending on your symptoms you may have to wait a long time to be seen by a doctor.

Ensure you take your OSHC card with you to the hospital (carry the card in your wallet or purse), however you may still be required to pay for your treatment up-front. See page 90 for information on emergency healthcare.

Remember to ask the doctor for a medical certificate if you intend to apply for Special Consideration for your study assessments because of a medical condition (see page 72 for more information), or if you have been away from work and need a certificate to show your employer.

#### Billing

Always check the doctor's fee and what you will need to pay. Your OSHC provider refund is based on the Australian government's Medicare Benefits Schedule Fee (Medicare rebate). Many doctors charge more than the Schedule Fee and this means you pay the difference (called 'the gap'). Keep the receipt of your payment and claim the amount of the Medicare rebate from your OSHC provider. See under Medical centres for details on who can bill Allianz Global Assistance directly so you don't have to claim the rebate yourself.

#### Prescriptions

If the doctor prescribes medicine or a treatment, you will need to take the prescription to a pharmacy and pay for the medicine. OSHC covers part of the cost of some prescription medication, up to AUD\$300 a year: you pay the first AUD\$36.10 (2015 rate, subject to change). Check the OSHC by Allianz Global Assistance website for further information:

#### Emergency healthcare

If you have an urgent need for healthcare, dial '000' (triple-zero) for an ambulance – this is a free call and can be made from any phone at any time. The ambulance will take you to the

Accident and Emergency Department in your nearest hospital.

Ambulances are not doctors – they are paramedics – and are for emergencies to save someone from death or serious injury rather than for general illness. Call an ambulance if the problem is too urgent to wait (e.g. someone is having difficulty breathing) or the injury is too severe to transport safely by taxi or car (e.g. broken limbs). If it's not urgent or life-threatening and you are unsure if you need an ambulance, either call your OSHC Allianz on 1800 814 781, or Nurse-on-Call on 1300 60 60 24.

We strongly recommend you buy an Ambulance Victoria (AV) membership: this will mean that you are always covered for an ambulance within Australia. The AV membership is only available for students whose visa is granted for 12 months or more.

#### **Transport accidents**

If you have been injured in a transport accident (any accident involving a tram, train, car or motorbike), you do not have to pay for an ambulance. The Transport Accident Commission (TAC) will pay for the ambulance service once you have made a successful claim with the commission.

While you are in Australia, you may need legal advice on a variety of matters such as employment, motor vehicle accidents, tenancy or criminal offences. #### ANIMALS AND WILDLIFE

Australia is known for having unique wildlife and many of the world's most dangerous animals. Venomous snakes are generally found in the bush and some suburbs close to parkland.

The Redback spider is venomous and inhabits city and country areas, in garages, sheds, fences, under houses, near pot plants in gardens and outdoor furniture. The poisonous brown snake has been seen on the Melbourne Campus, mainly in summer. Snakes live near waterways and are active in spring and summer. Crocodiles do not

inhabit Victoria, nor New South Wales – they live in waterways and beaches in tropical northern Australia, including Cairns, Broome and Darwin. Native animals in Victoria are protected under state laws.

#### Coming across a snake

All animals should be left alone if naturally occurring in the wild. If they are posing a risk to your safety – contact your resident supervisor if you live on campus and ask them to contact a licensed snake handler. You can also contact University emergency security for assistance – see page 74. When you are off campus, contact one of the numbers listed further below for assistance.

#### Coming across injured wildlife

If you come across injured wildlife, if it is safe to do so, gently cover the animal with a towel or jacket, keep it in the dark, and do not give it food or water.

#### **SAFETY**

#### Personal safety

There are always risks when you are out and about, especially at night. Here are some tips to stay safe:

- Avoid walking through parks, lanes or poorlylit areas at night.
- Before you walk or take public transport on your own at night, ask a local resident or your neighbour if it is safe to do so in that area.
- If you are walking at night: make sure you're aware of your surroundings at all times. Do not focus all of your attention on your mobile phone or device.
- Look after your personal belongings: carry your bag close to you with the clasp facing inwards, hide expensive gear such as mobile phones, laptops or iPads and tablets.
- In pubs, bars and clubs don't accept drinks from strangers and never leave your drink unattended.
- If you're going to be out late or don't want to travel on public transport on your own, try to arrange a lift home with someone you know or make your journey by taxi.
- If you're travelling alone by taxi, sit in the back seat.
- Do not hitchhike or offer rides to strangers.

#### Transport safety

While waiting for public transport at night you should stand or sit in well-lit areas. At suburban train stations, stand within the designated safety zones (these zones are usually marked with yellow boundaries). Once inside the train, sit towards the front of the first carriage, near the driver. Don't hesitate to press the emergency button if trouble arises in the carriage. Make sure you always plan your trip, and tell someone when you expect to return home.

Before you go on holidays or trips, we recommend you regularly refer to the area's websites to check on specific issues such as bushfire safety, or swimming at a surf beach. More information on safety can also be found at: latrobe.edu.au/experience/living/safety/enjoying-the-great-outdoors

#### Road safety

In Australia people drive on the left-hand side of the road. Take care when crossing roads, ensure that you first look to the right, then left and look right again before crossing. You must cross at designated pedestrian crossings or traffic lights where available. Melbourne has the largest tram network in the world. Be sure you look for trams when crossing tram tracks.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

During University Orientation, we have a dedicated session to tell you all about safety while studying in Australia. LTI has extensive online safety information: latrobe.edu.au/experience/living/safety It's especially important to not wear your headphones when crossing roads, so that you are aware of oncoming traffic. Melbourne's train network is mostly above-ground so there are many railway crossings – do not enter the crossing when warning lights are flashing or when the boom gates are activated.

#### TRANSPORT

#### International Driving Permit

You may drive on a valid overseas licence while holding a student or other temporary visa, provided the licence is written either in English or is accompanied by an official English translation. An International Driving Permit is considered a valid translation. However, it's important to note an International Driving Permit is only a translation of a driver's licence, it is not a licence. For your International Driving Permit to be valid, you must also carry your overseas licence when driving.

If you do not hold an International Driving Permit, contact the Victorian Interpreting and Translating Service (VITS). Translation takes about five business days to complete.

#### Driving

Before you start driving in Australia, take some lessons to familiarise yourself with local driving conditions and road laws, including:

- All occupants in a car, including passengers, must wear seatbelts.
- Drivers must be under the legal blood alcohol concentration (BAC) limit, which is 0.05 (BAC) on a full licence, and 0.00 on a probationary licence or for drivers of taxis, buses and other large vehicles. Drink driving results in serious consequences, which may include criminal law proceedings, heavy fines and suspension of your licence.
- Only hands-free mobile phone use is allowed.
   Do not text or hold a handset while driving.
   Even having the phone on your lap while driving is against the law. Costly fines are issued to offenders.
- At some intersections in the Melbourne city centre, 'hook turns' are required. Marked with a black and white sign hanging high above the intersection, hook turn intersections are where drivers turn right from the left-hand lane.

• If you have small children, they are required by law to be seated in appropriate child restraints. You can find out more by reading information, in our Students with Spouse and/or Children Guide on our website, or the VicRoads website:

#### Cycling

Cycling is a cheap and fun way to travel, and you even get some exercise on the way. Melbourne and regional Victoria are becoming increasingly bike-friendly, with more and more bike paths and lanes provided for safe transit. Certain road rules apply including:

- No riding on footpaths.
- You must wear an approved safety helmet (except for medical and/or religious reasons).
- Bicycles must have a bell or horn, an efficient brake and, when riding at night, a white headlight, red tail-light and red rear-reflector.

#### **GETTING AROUND MELBOURNE**

#### Tickets and fares

Myki is a reusable smart card that you store money to pay your public transport fares. You can store ('top up') money on your myki card online or by using a myki machine at train stations, or at a myki retail outlet or 7-Eleven.

To use Myki, just hold your card over the sensor each time you enter and depart a train, tram or bus. This is called 'touching on' and 'touching off'. You only have to 'touch off' on the tram if your whole trip was in Zone 2. You can buy a myki card online, at metropolitan premium train stations, some retail outlets including 7-Eleven, on the Melbourne Campus (at the post office, Student Union, and at the David Myers Building bus loop myki machine) or by calling 13 69 54.

We also recommend you register your myki on the website and check your transactions for any errors.

#### Trains, trams and buses

The metropolitan public transport system incorporates train, tram and bus services. You can change between services as often as you like on the one ticket as long as you scan your myki on each service. Public Transport in Metropolitan Melbourne covers two zones. Zone 1 and Zone 2, and includes a zone boundary overlap. Fares are based on the zones where travel occurs, whether in a single zone or across both zones. The Melbourne Campus is located in an overlapping area - Zone 1 is the inner zone for public transport in metropolitan Melbourne and Zone 2 is the outer zone. In 2015, you can travel on trains, trams and buses across Zones 1 and 2, for the price of a Zone 1 fare. If you are only travelling in Zone 2, you can get the cheaper Zone 2 fare.

The route 86 tram, and route 250, and 350 buses, run straight from the city centre to the Melbourne Campus. Reservoir and Macleod are the two train stations closest to the Campus. Both can be reached via 561 bus. Some of the areas north of the Campus are in Zone 2 only. Travelling exclusively within this zone will be cheaper. It is important to check which zones your journey covers to ensure your myki has enough value to cover your entire journey.

Train and tram services generally operate from 5am to 2am Monday to Saturday, and 6am to 1am on Sundays. Operating hours vary for local bus services.

From February 2016, there will be a new express shuttle bus running from Reservoir Train Station directly to the Melbourne Campus during the academic year. The new 301 bus will significantly reduce transfer times from Reservoir to the Campus.

NightRider buses travel between the city (departing from Swanston Street, between Flinders Lane and Flinders Street) and Melbourne's outer suburbs every 30 minutes between 1.30am and 4.30am on Saturday and 1.30am and 5.30am on Sunday. The NightRider Epping route operates close to the Melbourne Campus and the NightRider Eltham comes onto the Campus on request. There is also free transport around the city centre with the route 35 City Circle Tram.

A new Free Tram Zone in Melbourne CBD has been implemented in 2015 and the area covers the iconic Queen Victoria Market, across to Victoria Harbour in Docklands, up to Spring Street and over to Flinders Street Station and Federation Square. You don't need a myki when travelling on trams within this zone. However if your journey starts or finishes outside the boundaries of the Free Tram Zone, you must 'touch on' with your myki in the normal way to make sure you have a valid ticket.

#### Concession fares

In Victoria, only Australia Awards undergraduate students or students on a formal student exchange program are eligible for transport concession. However, under a new three-year trial, international students studying in Melbourne (including City and Franklin Street campuses), on an undergraduate program, can have 50 per cent off a 365-day public transport pass. All other international students must pay the full fare. If you travel without a valid ticket, or on a concession ticket without a concession card, you are at risk of being fined by ticket inspectors. Annual on-campus parking permits for the Melbourne Campus may be purchased from Traffic and Parking, Ground Floor, Peribolos East Building. For general parking, a full-year general permit (white) can be purchased for AUD\$260 (2015 price, subject to change).

La Trobe Student Union (LTSU) members receive discounted parking permits, AUD\$240 (see page 81 for details on the Union). If you arrive in second semester a parking permit is around half price. All motorists (other than motorcyclists) who want to use the Campus car parks must have a valid parking permit or a daily vending machine ticket. Daily tickets are available from coin-operated vending machines in the car park for AUD\$5.50 a day.

#### **GETTING AROUND BENDIGO**

#### **Buses**

Bendigo buses operate regularly between the Campus and the Bendigo city centre, with bus stops conveniently located around the Campus. The bus runs on the myki smartcard system.

You can buy a myki card online, at the Bendigo train station, post offices and at some retail outlets. International students (except those who are eligible to buy a concession myki) pay the full fare price, approximately AUD\$2.20

valid for two hours in one travel zone (2015 fare, subject to change). Timetables are available at La Trobe International (Regional Campuses), from the Bendigo Student Association, from bus drivers and at the railway station.

The bus service also runs directly between the Campus and the railway station until 6.30pm. christiansbus.com.au

#### Car parking

All parking on the Campus requires a permit, which may be purchased from the Student Administration Centre (the 2015 annual fee was AUD\$66.50 (subject to change). If you arrive in Semester 2 (July), the parking permit is half price. For further information:

#### **Trains**

V/Line operates regional train services between Melbourne and many regional centres including Bendigo, Shepparton and Albury. In Victoria, outside of Melbourne, only students on a formal student exchange program or Australia Awards undergraduate students, are eligible for a public transport concession card. Application forms are available from La Trobe International (Regional Campuses). See page 97.

If you are eligible for a concession card you must carry it each time you buy and travel on public transport. This concession card is also valid for use on Melbourne's transport services. V/Line tickets also permit you to travel for free

up to one hour before your journey departs, and one hour after your arrival, in Melbourne.

**Important!** If you travel without a valid ticket, or travel on a concession ticket when you are ineligible for concession fares, you are at risk of being fined by ticket inspectors.

V/Line regularly offers discounted group fares, and rates are cheaper during weekday, off-peak times. Check the website for more moneysaving options.

#### GETTING AROUND ALBURY-WODONGA

#### Student concession cards

Albury-Wodonga is on the border of two states – Victoria and New South Wales. There are different laws and regulations on either side of the border. In Victoria, only specific students or students studying on a formal student exchange program are eligible for a public transport concession card (see under Concession fares, page 97). In New South Wales, international students may use an International Student Identity Card, purchased from STA Travel, to get a concession fare on CountryLink trains from Albury. Please also see under Trains on page 98.

#### Maps

Whether you are relying on public transport or driving a car, it is a good idea to have a local street directory. You will be given a local map, as well as train and bus timetables, in your Welcome Pack from International Student Services (Albury-Wodonga) on arrival.

#### Driving

#### SHOPPING AND FOOD

#### Melbourne

There is an abundance of multicultural food in Melbourne. Major supermarkets such as Coles and Woolworths generally open from about 6am to 10pm, and some stores are open 24 hours, while independent and other supermarkets generally open from 7am to 7pm most weekdays and to 5pm on weekends. You can save money by buying fresh produce, as it's not subject to the Goods and Services Tax (GST).

There are also 24-hour convenience stores but these are generally more expensive. Department stores, shops and boutiques in the Melbourne Central Business District (CBD) or city, and in surrounding shopping precincts, are generally open from 9am or 10am to 5pm or 6pm, Monday to Wednesday and Saturday. Late night shopping is generally available on Thursdays and Fridays, until 9pm, and major stores may open on Sundays.

Polaris, a new shopping complex including a supermarket, is right next to the Melbourne Campus on Plenty Road. Uni Hill Factory Outlets, further north in Bundoora, is a large shopping centre with department stores. Northland Shopping Centre in Preston is also close to the Campus:

In summer there is a very popular night market every Wednesday, with a wide range of food stalls from around the world, live music, clothing stalls and locally-made goods.

#### Bendigo

Department and retail stores are generally open 9am to 5.30pm on weekdays, with late night shopping on Thursdays and Fridays. Most small retailers and all major shops are open on weekends. There is an abundance of multicultural food in Bendigo and halal food is readily available. The Bendigo Community Farmer's Market runs on the second Sunday of each month, offering fresh, regional and seasonal produce. There are many supermarkets, with one located only a five-minute walk from the Bendigo Campus.




# MILDURA CAMPUS MAP


# SHEPPARTON CAMPUS MAP

The nearest train stations are Flagstaff and Melbourne Central.



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## **GLOSSARY**

#### **Academic Colleges**

The University has two colleges that own all of our various courses and programs: Arts, Social Sciences and Commerce (ASSC) and Science, Health and Engineering (SHE).

#### Assessment

This is a measurement of a student's skills and knowledge. Assessment for learning at La Trobe University is central to subject and course design, to promote, reinforce and reward student learning. It is a systematic approach that builds and enhances graduate capabilities through tasks that are diverse, complementary and embedded strategically throughout a program of study. See:

#### Australia Awards

The Australia Awards Scholarships program aims to promote knowledge and linkages between Australia, our regional neighbours and the broader international community. The awards offer the next generation of global leaders an opportunity to undertake study in Australia and for high-achieving Australians to do the same overseas.

#### Bond

In Australia, when renting a property you will need to pay a security deposit or 'bond', plus rent in advance (usually four weeks' worth).

When you pay a bond, the landlord or representative must give you a receipt – no later than when the payment is received. The bond is held to repair any damage that you, your housemates or house guests may cause to the property while you are renting. If there is no damage to the property when you move out, you should receive your bond back. Some private student accommodation providers will deduct a cleaning charge from your bond.

#### Census Date

The date within each study period when your enrolment for a subject must be finalised, otherwise you will incur fees and charges. It is the last day that you can withdraw from a subject without financial penalty.

#### CoE - Confirmation of Enrolment

A form issued by the University to international students studying in Australia on a student visa, for student visa purposes..

#### Credit points

The value of the contribution each unit of study provides towards your course completion. Each subject is normally worth 15 or 30 credit points.

#### Deferral

When you wish to delay the commencement of your course for one or two semesters (a maximum of two semesters or up to one year is permitted). Students must first contact La Trobe International before deferring any studies.

#### DIRP

Department of Immigration and Border Protection

#### Framework

A legislative framework that includes the *Education Services for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act 2000*, regulations and related legislation, and the *National Code 2007*.

#### **ELICOS**

English Language Intensive Courses for Overseas Students

#### **Enrolment**

The process of formally registering into a university program, as either a commencing or continuing student.

#### ISA

International Students Association.

#### ISS

International Student Services at La Trobe International.

## Leave of Absence/Intermission/Suspension of Candidature

A Leave of Absence is a period of time when a student is approved to suspend their enrolment in a course. International students may intermit only on the grounds of compassionate or compelling circumstances.

#### LTI

#### Residential Colleges

These are halls of residence for on-campus accommodation: Chisholm, Glenn and Menzies (Melbourne Campus).

#### SoA - Statement of Account

The Statement of Account (SoA) is an official record of a student's fees. The SoA details the subjects that a student is enrolled in and the Census Dates, total fees payable, the due date and methods of payment.

#### **Special Consideration**

Students whose performance at an examination or assessment is seriously affected by illness or other special causes may apply for a Special Consideration. See page 72.
